We recd yours with the Minutes of the Board of the 20th of April last and Mr Maules remarks upon our Conduct in the management of the Derwentwater Estate which we are Sorry he has had the Trouble of and that he has had reason to trouble the Board therewith as we can asure them and you of our great desire to Serve the Honble Board with all the integrity imaginable and with the Strictest Justice & tho by the great hurry we have had in Letting the Estate we may have Sliped somethings that otherwise

would have been observed yet we dare venture to say the Hospitall has not Suffered anything under our Care where it has been in our power to prevent it

Inclosed we send you answers to Each paragraph in the observations. The Original apraizment or Sale of Redheaths Stock Mr Stephenson Moor Masters Accot of the Dues of Lead Oare for the year 1735 & 1736 an abstract thereof & what they amount to & if agreemt with the Quakers Companys Agent for the Same these things we send with our answers for the Boards Satisfaction wch we hope will together Shew our Integrity and that we mean to doe 'em nothing but Justice what papers you now receive being Originalls except our answers to the observations will be of use to us therefore we Desire you will after you have made the proper use of 'em return 'em to us

You were acquainted the 4th Decer last wth a Claim being made to Haydon Town Farme as being on an Old Lease not yet expired at the yearly rent of £32 and in answer thereto the Board were pleased to order a further enquiry to be made into the Claime which has been accordingly done but tho' the Farme was Confirmed to Jno Fairlam and John Bell at £45 per Ann of which the Claimants were aprized they did not produce any thing to Shew their Right till Just before mayday when they produced a Copy of a Claime made by them at the Forfeiture wch they say was allowed of a copy whereof you have Inclosed, you wll be pleased to observe that tho' this Claim is produced Green one of the Claimants axcepted of a New Lease from the Derwt Family under which he enjoyed 21 Years at an advance Rent wch Mr Gray is of opinion destroys the Title they pretend to by virtue of this Claim we have therefore by the advice of Mr Gray Served ejectn upon the Claimants Edwd Green Jno Green Thos Hawden Edwd Coates and widdow Green in order to throw 'em out of possession next Term & we hope the Board will approve thereof Mr Aynsley we are Informd has been so friendly as to bind all the parties in £100 to Stand as a Tryall

we have further to acquaint you that 2 days before Mayday Mr Aynsley produced an Article for a Lease of Dilston Mill under the hand of Mr Thos Errington late Agent to the Derwentwater family Signed in the Guardianship of the Countess of Derwentwater & Sr John Webb whereby it appears that he had a Terme in those mills for four Years yett to come at a yearly rent of £15 – we have taken Councellor Grays advice about this afair and he Says that the Article cannot be of any use Longer than Mr Errington had a power to lett which could be no longer than the Guardianship Subsisted and Consequently Mr Aynsley can have a right by vertue of that article no longer than Mr Radcliffe wd have been at age when the Guardianship and the power given Mr Errington ceased to all intents and purposes we have therefore ordered Mr Airey to Serve Ejectmts upon Mr Aynsley, but he has thot fitt to promise he will give the Tennant no trouble & leaves it to the Board to determine whether he has a right or not we therefore begg the Board will be pleased to give us proper Instructions therein that we may have an Intire end made to the dispute.

Boards Minutes

1735/6 Febry 4th The Receivers are to Sell all the Dues of Lead Oare, which was wrought in or before the year 1735, as well as the Dues which may arise in this year to the best Advantage.

Mr Maules Remarks

It appears by a Letter from the Moor Master that there had been raised from Peatslack Hill Vein alone between Christmas 1735 & the 2d Octor 1736, near 220 Bings besides what may have been Raised before and Since from that & other Mines none of which is brought to Account by the Receivers nor any Accot of its being Sold as ordered by this Minute.

NB Each Bing of Oar is worth 42sh or 43sh at least.

Receivers Answer

The Dues of Lead Oare within the Mannor of Alston moore, raised in the years 1735 & 1736 were Sold to the Governr & Co for Smelting down Lead etc the 18 June last as appears by an Agreement under the hand of their Agent, Mr Abraham Watson Sent herewith as Also the Moore Masters Accot of the Delivery thereof and an Abstract shewing the Totall of each Sort of Oare & what it amounts to. The time of payment for those Dues was the 1st of April last & we have within that Month recd £700 in part. The prices of Oare is always governed by the prices Lead Sells for, & there is at all

times 5s difference between Bouse & Cutting Oare. The 220 Bings said to be raised at Peatstack hill was the whole quantity computed at that time & not the Dues only.

We apprehended that it was the Boards desire not to be troubled with things of this kind till they were Completed, & we intended it should have Come with our Cash Accot for the Month of April last.

Boards Minutes

1735/6 Febry 24th Ordered Mr Watsons Accot delivered us by Mr Gilling of the Fee Farm Rents & Outgoings Issuing out of & payble from the Derwentwater Estate to Sundry Persons amounting in the whole to £111.8.21/2 per Ann be Sent to the Recers & if the Same Accot should not be right or Exact in any particular they are to Send their Remarks & Observations thereon to this Board.

Mr Maules Remarks

I don't find any Inquiry has been made about this Affair, on the Contrary I find by the last Cash Accot reced from them they have Suffered Mr Fenwick to levy a Small Rent of 3/4 per Ann due to him by that Accot for Buteland by Distress made on the Tennant the Expence of which they Charge on the Hospital in their Cash Accot for February.

NB There are a great many of these Small Rents Still owing & if not Soon look'd into may be levyed in the Same Manner, which will be an Expence to the Hospital if the Consequence is not worse, therefore wth Submission I think deserves the Consideration of the Board.

Receivers Answer

The Accot of the Fee Farm Rents & Outgoings Issuing out of the Derwentwater Estate, we acknowledged the rect of the 7 March 1735/6 & so farr as we have had an opportunity of examining it, we find the same to be right with the addition of £1.1.- per Annum due to Walter Blackett Esqr for Coastley Tyths & it is incosted in the Rentall made up by Mr Boag at London amongst the other Outgoings amounting in all to £112.9.21/2.

The distress made by Mr Fenwick was for 5 Years Arrear, 3 whereof in the late Receivers time, & the other two years Since we have had the Honr to be Concerned, but till the time that we allowed it to the Tennant we never heard of a demand or that Such distress was made & as it then appeared to agree with the Outgoings & the Charge that had accrued only 2/6 it was thought not worth disputing. We cannot think there can be any Ill Consequence attending the Nonpayment of Fee Farme Rents nay Mr Gray on the Contrary In forms us that all Fee Farm Rents Issuing out of the Derwentwater Estate & not Claimed at the Forfeiture are without dispute forfeited & not now liable to be pay'd by the Hospital. As this may therefore we humbly think deserve the Consideration of the Board, we desire their directions whether we must pay any more Outgoings of that kind or not.

Boards Minutes

1736 Sepr 1st Ordered, that the Recers do Sell the Deer in Dilston Park on the best Terms & assoon as they can.

Mr Maules Remarks

It does not appear that any Notice has been taken of this Minute.

Receivers Answer

The Orders we had for Selling the Deer in Dilston park was observed as much as we could yett we could gett no more than two Sold at 16s each, wch were killed by Mr Sunderland & others & will be brought to Accot amongst Severall Small things reced by Mr Bunting Bailiff in this Month.

Boards Minutes

1736 Novr 17th Ordered that the Receivers do Sell the Coppers in Dilston House for the most they can gett for them

Mr Maules Remarks

It does not appear that any Notice has been taken of this Minute.

Receivers Answer

The Coppers in Dilston House has been exposed to Sale but we have not yet been able to Sell 'em at what we believe they are worth. & we did not apprehend it was necessary to acquaint the Board or give them any trouble abt them till they were Sold.

Mr Maules Remarks

In examining the Accot of Sale of Gerrard Readheads Stock at Whittles the 5 May 1736 Sent up to the Board by the Recers in their Letter of the 27 March I find they have omitted to Credit said Readhead for a Cow which appears to have been Sold to John Newton & for which he had pd the Recers in part of the Paid Cow as appears by their Cash Accot the 12th Febry 1736/7 £4.10 Qry what this Cow was Sold for & why left out of the Accot there is due by James Gaire & Mattw Dodds a Note of hand payable last Novemr for £4.5.- & by Mr Richd Dobson £50 for the Crop of Corn Sold him, neither of which are brought to Accot.

Receivers Answer

The Sale of Gerrard Readheads goods & the appraizment thereof is Sent herewith, which Shews that there was not a Cow Sold to John Newton, & it is a mistake in as that £4.10 is brought to Accot the 12th February last, in part for a Cow Sold. as it Should

have been £4.5.- in full for the Cow Sold Gare & Dodds one of whom is a Servt to the

have been £4.5.- in full for the Cow Sold Gare & Dodds one of whom is a Servt to the said Newton. This mistake is Sett right in our Cash Accot for the Month of April. The £50 was due from Mr Richd Dobson the 1st Inst & will be punctually paid. & the whole of the Readheads Stock & Crop Sold amounted to no more than £96.15.4

Mr Maules Remarks

The Receivers has Charged in their Cash Accounts Money pd for Cording 93 Cord of Wood £9.6 but have not brought to Accot any money reced for that Wood, nor taken any Notice what it is Sold for, tho' some of it appears to have been Sold above 12 Months.

Receivers Answer

There was 93 Cord of Wood Sold to Mr Joseph Cotton, Vizt 77 at 6s & 16 at 5s which was Cutt out of the refuse Wood Cutt down for the branches in Devils Water Widehaugh & Fourstones and by Agreement was to be Charr Coated & taken away before Marts 1737 & we will take care that it shall be So coated & pay'd for before or at that time. But as it is not possible to preserve it without some Embezilment it may probably fall some small matter Short of the Quantity above, tho' we hope it will not.

Mr Maules Remarks

They write the Board the 5 Novr 1736, that they had Converted in to Money the Weedings of the Woods at Newlands & Whittonstall amounting to £55.15.101/2d but I don't find they have brought to Accot any more than £51.4.5d

Receivers Answer

The £51.4.5d part of the amount of the Weedings at Newlands was all that we reced for at that time, but by our Cash Accot the beginning of this Month the remaining part will appear to have been reced & is there brought to Accot by us.

Mr Maules Remarks

In looking over the List of Arrears due by Several Tennants at Martinmas 1734 delivered to me by order of the Board the 13th April 1737 I observe that most of these Tents have Continued in the same Farms are Reputed good Men & have pd Rent to the present Recers tho' no Notice has been taken of these Arrears

Receivers Answer

The List of Arrears due at Martinmas 1734 has been examined by us & some pretend to have paid the late Recers others Claim Allowance etc which they have not yett been able to Shew were Just, & till Such time as these matters in dispute were Settled we did not apprehend it necessary to trouble the Board therewith. But on being Informed that

an Extent was issued against some of the Persons in the returned List of Arrears we acquainted the Board whose Orders we wait before we proceed any further in making any demands. Note that Mr Watson's List of Arrears seem to amount to no more than £508.19.91/2d tho' it is neither Cast up nor Signed by him.

Mr Maules Remarks

Mr Francis Anderson of Alnwick quitted his Farm at Mayday 1736 & was then further in Arrears or appears by the Receivers Cash Accot £38.15. in all £59.16.10 of which none have been reced.

Receivers Answer

Mr Francis Anderson of Alnwick Farmed the Tyths of Larbottle & Alnwk House & Closes from Marts 1734 to Mayday 1735 & was in the Rentall Sent us by the Secretary returned at £44.10. He has paid us £38 & is in Arrears £36.15 as will appear by the List of Arrears at Marts last besides what he is in Arrears at Marts 1734.

Mr Maules Remarks

Reynold Hall Esqr was putt out of the Collry he Rented at Mayday 1735, when it appears he was in Arrears 31/2 years Rent at £5 per Ann. he is recommended as a preferable Tennant to James Dodds who has been Tennant Since Mayday 1735, but neither of 'em have paid any Rent as yet to the Hospitall.

Receivers Answer

Reynold Hall Esqr was putt out of the Collry at Greenhead by James Dodds at Mayday 1735 when he was in Arrears 31/2 years Rent at £5 per Annum & it is very true that neither of 'em has paid any Rent to the Hospital, but that has been altogether occasioned by the dispute of the Right in that Royalty. Mr Hall we always looked upon as a preferable Tennant to James Dodds yett with regard to the Claim being given up, we tho't it preferable that James Dodds should be admitted Tennant, and he was admitted Tennant accordingly. As to the Arrear that is now due the necessary Steps shall be taken for the recovery thereof after we have reced the Boards further Commands.

Mr Maules Remarks

There is amongst the Fee Farme Rents said to be in Arrears one Gibson Charged for some Lands at Corbridge 6s per Ann which I don't find in any Rentall either of the late or present Receivers & Sevll others said to be in Arrear for the year 1734 have pd for the year 1735 I humbly conceive the present Receivers might easily discover the said Arrears are due or not, and if they are realy due that they should in Obedience to a

Minute of the Board of the 17 November 1736 take proper Methods to recover the same to the Hospital. The Amount per List is £512.9.91/2 but shou'd be £516.9.91/2

Receivers Answer

The 6s per Annum was not in the Rental Sent us by the Secretary, but amongst the Rest of the Examinations we have made about these Arrears we find it is due & has been paid to Mr Watson, we mean the 3 years returned in Arrear, & we will take care to receive the growing Rent.

These Answers we humbly offer to the Consideration of the Honble Board of Directors for Greenwich Hospital, to whom we hope they will be Satisfactory & are their Honours

I Sent the Doctor a kitt of Salmond I am Sure I ordered him one above two Months Since & I neither can hear of it, being Ship'd from Berwick nor of its being come to hand. I Directed it to be left at Mr Robert Wilsons Corn factor in Mark Lane & desired it to be Sent him to Greenwich but as it is so long a time Since I Expected he had gott it & he has not I am Afraid it Spoyled lost or Mislaid, pray my humble Service to him for I am Ashamed of his & your Kindness while with you

As to the Expence that attends the Courtkeeping in treating Severall Freeholders etc Mr Walton & I desire no unreasonable thing of the board, & it is a distinct Charge from the Courtkeepers Sallarys but if the board should think it our due to pay we Submitt, but as you observe it's what is bore by all Lords of Manors in England.

We are not a little Surprized at Mr Maules Ill natured observations upon us & his attacking our Integrity so all which we hope we have Sr Cleared up to the Satisfaction of the Board, and doe assure you that we desire to be no longer Concerned then we act with Justice & the Utmost Integrity for the good of the Hospitall, and we humbly hope the honble Board have not Conceived an Ill opinion of us.

That of Mr Maules putting the board upon Corresponding with the Moor Master about the Lead Mines we think doing us wrong as it will tend to Lessen our Character here in the Country & the Hospitall not gett one farthing by it, and we think our Selves as Capable as that branch as any of the other, Mr Maule takes notice of the late Recers Selling the Lead Oare Dues for 2 years at 43s & 43/6d & Sayes that Mr Watson made no distinction between Bouse & Cutting Oare as we doe, but does not take notice of the same Recers Selling the Lead Oare the year before we were Concerned for 32/6d & 37/6d per bing which is agood deal less than what we sold them for & there they make

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5s per bing difference between Bouse & Cutting Oare, & I doe assure you the Moor Master declaires there always Was 5s per bing difference between the bouse & Cutting Oare ever since he was Concerned in the Derwentwaters familys time, as for the 2 first years when the Dues were sold for 43s & 43/6d there was no Cutting Oare raised besides it's not possible to Sell always a Comodity for one & the same price we Sold the Dues for the year 1735 & 1736 Vizt Bouse Oare at 42/6d & a Guinea over & the Cutting Oare at 37/6d per bing, I hope Mr Watsons Management in all the parts of the Estate shall be no precedent to us tho'he seems to Quote him. I am sorry Mr Maule has so mean opinion of us, I Suspect he has had some Ill Impressions made to him of us from Mr Willock for some reasons not prudent to mention.

Included in the Acct Stated between Mr Blackett & the Hospitall as we Apprehended it <Stated>, by wch there Appears to be due at Martinms 1734 for Accot of Sums <Stand> £6 whereas the Extract is for no more than £4

The Reason why we desired the article of £9.14.101/2 wch Accrued in holding the Courts of Newlands &c to be Allowed us was that we never Understood any Expence of Courtkeeping Save any Courtkeepers Salareys to be upon us, & as we believe Such Expence is always born by the Lords of Mannors all over England we hoped the Board would allow the Same to us. But as we desire nothing but what they think a reasonable thing, & as it is an Expence that will accrue only once a Year we humble Submitt it to the Boards pleasure whether they will allow it or not

We Observe Mr Maules Letter in answer to which the Late receers were only Concerned in the Rect of the Derwentwater Rents from Marts 1731. That they Sold the Dues of Lead Oare for 1732 & 1733 for 43s & 43/6 per Bing being all Bouse Oare, & that they Sold the Dues in the Year 1734 for 37/6d for Bouse & 32/6d for Cutting Oare by wch Mr Maule might have Observed a difference of 5s per Bing, as the Moor Master Assures us there always was in the time he has been concern'd in the D-er Family

How farr we are Impowered to Sell the Dues of Lead Oare by our Commission, the Directors themselves are best able to Judge but we begg leave to Observe that we have not presumed to Sell any Dues without the Boards Particular Command, to which we refer in their Minute of the 4th Febridy 1735/6 for the sale of the Dues for 1735 & 1736 & to their Minute of the 4th May last for the Sale of those for 1737

We never thought our Selves Exempt from any Rules the Directors have thought fit to prescribe to us but have in all aspects conformed thereto as Near as we could; This however we are Certaine of that we have always acted with Justice to the Hospital, & no longer than we do Soe do we desire their Countenance and favour.

We have examined the Recets of Severall & Inclosed you have Coppys of Mr Miles Willson Recets from the time he entered upon his Farme (wch was at Ladyday 1731) to Marts last, by which it very plainly appears he has payd Six years Rent, which must be in full to Ladyda y last altho' due the Martinmas preceding.

The Quakers company's Agent having Offered 46s per Bing for Bouse & 41 per Bing for Cutting Oare & Geo Liddell Esqr & Compy having offered the same & one Guinea & half over. we have agreed with the latter as best bidders, for all the Dues of Lead Oare arising within the Manor of Aldstone Moore from Christmas last to Christms next to be paid in April next which we hope the Board will approve of This price for Lead Oare is we believe the highest that has been known in that Country, the reason for which we apprehend to be this, that the Quakers having a Lead Mill ready erected are distressed for want of Oare to keep her going, by reason of the poverty of the Lead Mines in & about Aldston Moore, & not onely that But Sevl other Mills are lying for want of Oare & this Scarcity <still...& will,> or as <....> the price by that Mill wth Coll Liddell Parts are Erectg in Aldston <mre> where for some time the whole quantity to be raised will not be Sufficient to keep the Mill going.

We are Sorry to in forme you that at Tarret burn in the Manour of Wark, where a Lead Mine has formerly been wrought, & where Geo Liddell Esqr & Partners had begun further Tryall the Royaltys are claimed by Severall who have given the Workmen a discharge, upon which Accot that work is at present Stop'd. Wee have allways believed the Royaltys in that part belonged to the Hospitall & we doubt not but it will appear to be so, yet least we should run the Hospitall into vexatious Suite, we have thought it more proper to desist than proceed in working, till a particular enquiry is made into the Affair. We wrote you the 22nd Inst about the discharge given to the persons Imployed by George Liddell Esqr & Partners, at Tarrett Burn in Tindale within the Manour of Wark & therein acquainted you that we would make enquiry & give you a particular Accot of the whole Affair

We have accordingly made all the enquiry we had an opportunity of doing, & have Examined the old papers at Dilston & from the whole we cannot find whether the Mine in dispute was let by the Derwentwater family or not.

By the Grant it appears that all the Mineralls within the Manour of Wark were granted to the predicessors of the Derwentwater family, & this place being within what is Called Tindale, is undoubtedly the right of the Hospitall, tho' the great distance of time Since the Mine has been wrought, & the want of foot steps to trace it makes it very difficult to find it out. We have been upon the Premisses & have examined Severall old people who Say they always believed & it was reputed that the Royaltys belonged to the Der----r family, that the Mine was wrought about 60 years agoe by One Curtis & afterwards by Alderman Ramsey, but that they do not know by whom authorized, but believes by the Lord <Derw.r> we have therefore to presume rights of the Hospitall (where it may probably be of great Consequence to them) Ordered Workmen to begin work & keep possession which we hope the Directors will approve of.

We find the possessors Severall Small Estates in Tarrett & Tarrett burn who call themselves freeholders have agreed to Try the Hospitall rights to the Royallitys in these parts & have Sett the Workmen to Work a Colliery in Terrett burn adjoyning the Hospitalls Tennt James Dodds & also another Colliery in Blackburn within the sd Manour of Wark, both which we have putt off work by discharging Gilbert Milburn & others at the former, & James Robson & others at the latter place we not only discharged these persons, but threw the Ropes & other work tools at each place downe the pitts, in the presence of the parties which we hope the Directors will approve off, & indeed unless what we have done be followed with vigirous proceedings in the Law the Hospitalls Libertys will be greatly infringed upon

We are greatly concerned to be informed by Mr Airey that no provision is made so as to have Tryall with the persons Claiming Haydon Town Farme the next Assizes, as it not only gives these persons an Oppertunity of Continuing upon the Farme another year, but greatly encourages that Sett of people whose View it is to distress the Hospitall in all their Affairs. We therefore earnestly begg the Directors will consider how much their Interest Suffers by these delays. & we begg to assure them that no Stone shall be left unturned to Support their Interest by Sr Yours etc

A Copy of a Letter from Mr Maule to Wm Corbett Esqr

Royal Hospitall Greenwch 3 Augt 1737

Sir

In answer to the Receivers Letter of the 5 July be pleased to acquaint the Board that I have Strictly examined & considered as much as in my power the affair in Dispute between the Hospitall and the Tennants of the Demiesne Lands of Keswick & by comparing the Copys of Miles Wilsons receipts for the Rent of his farme at Loaning head, which they say he entered upon at Ladyday 1731, it plainly appears he has paid Six years Rent, which must be in full to Ladyday 1737 tho due at Marts 1736; but then I apprehend as he entered on his Farme at Ladyday he enjoy'd the first years Crop & is to quitt possession at the Same time to the Succeeding Tennant

This appears plainly to me by tracing the Lease of Old Park wch they say was produced to them; John Fisher for some of his predecessrs take a Lease of this farme for 21 years from Ladyday 1711 by which they became bound to pay one half years Rent at Pentecost next following & the other half year at Marts after so that at Marts 1711 the first years Rent was due tho according to the Custome of Payg Rents was Seldom demanded till Ladyday. Fisher held his farme till Ladyday 1736 & by what I can find has paid 25 years Rent from Ladyday 1711 to Ladyday 1736 the the last ½ year became due by his Lease at Marts 1737 & upon paymt thereof by reason of some hardships complaind of in his Letter to the board of the 10 Janry he gives notice that he is to quitt his farme & the Receivrs advised the board the 24 Janry 1735/6 that they had lett the farme to Lanct Penny, who I suppose entered in full possession of it at Ladyday 1736 & <...> engaged to pay the Rent at the Same terms his predecessor had which he had usually complyed with hitherto; & the Tennants of this Manner have paid in many half years Rents as the Tennants of any other part of the Estate have, the only Difference that appears to me is that the Tennants of Keswick enter in full possession & enjoy all the profit of their farms from Ladyday & for that reason are bound to pay a whole years Rent at Martinmass following, whereas in other parts of the Estate the Tennant entering at Mayday is not in full possession till the Waygoing [struck out: 'Crops'] Tennts has cutt down his Crop which Seldom happens before Michs & therefore the first years Rent is not due till Mayday if this be the Case (as I apprehend it is) the dispute may <only> be determined by the Receivers answer to this one question : Did John Fisher enjoy the Crop of the year 1736 or did Lanct Penny enjoy it. If John Fisher enjoyd it he owes half a years Rent to the Hospitall having reapd the benefit of the farme 6 months after Ladyday, but if Lanct Penny enjoyed that Crop Fisher is acquitted having paid the half years Rent due at Marts 1735 & Penny became Dr for that half years Rent due at Pentecost following which by the Recers Cash Accot he paid in October last & that due Marts 1736 he paid in April last. In examining the Last Accot for June I find the charge for unavoidable Repaires in Meldon Park and Hartburn Grainge £29. 4s. 81/2 d which I doe not find any order of Board for, & I think cannot be

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comprehended in the Liberty allowed them by the Minute of the 9 Feb last, to Cause such repairs to be done from time to time as cannot be delayed till they receive particular orders from the board provided the Charge of such repaires do not exceed £10 its true these Repaires are on 3 Tenemts but I believe all in the occupation of the same Tennant & as it appears by the accot were a Month in hand, during which time I humbly think they should have advised the Board thereof & reced their directions

I beg you will also represent to the Board that among the Charity Boys there are some Boys who are now quallifyd to be bound out, tho they have not been three years in the School and Severall who might be quallifyd much sooner than that time if the board should think proper to give directions to Mr Weston their Schoolmaster, to advance such Boys as are capable in learning the necessary Rules prescribed by the Instructions and to acquaint the board when Such Boys are so quallifyd that they may be bound out tho they have not been three years in the School which would very much extend the Charity, which is humbly Submittd to the Board by Sir Your most humble Servt

The necessary Repaires amounting to £1160. 8. 2 we are putting in Execution & we beg leave to observe that the Board have given no Orders for doing anything at Newlands & Whittenstall which is in great necessity. In ours of the 20th Ulto we mentioned those Repaires & hoped that the Board would have given their Orders therein as we were in doubt whether they intended that we Shou'd proceed therein upon the Order of the Generall Court of the 26 Jany last. If therefore they expect that we Should proceed upon that Order, we Should be Glad of their pleasure therein.

We have Mr Maules Letter before us and in relation to the Keswick Rts we observe his Just Remarks upon it, & think the Question he has putt does not decide the Dispute for it is without all manner of Dispute certain that Such of the Tennants as have paid their last Rents have pd all Rents due from them to the late Mr Radcliffs Heirs, the Treasury & the Hospitall. We cannot possibly Say Whether Lancet Penny enjoyed the full Crop or total produce of the Farme he Entered upon at Ladyday 1736 or whether John Fisher enjoyed a part, but be that as it will it does not Seem to make any difference for it is a Custom & a very Just one here that where a Tennant enters upon a Farm having a Crop at his Entrance he has no right to a Crop when he leaves it. & on the Contrary where he enters upon no Crop he has a right to one at the Determination of his Farme so that whether Lancelot Penny entered upon a Crop or not he is obliged to pay his Rent from Ladyday 1736 to 1737.

The Case Seems to be this, That the Derwentwater Estate being on the Death of the late Mr Radcliff forfeited to the Government all Rents thereof became due to the Treasury etc from Martinmas 1731 which to Ladyday last is 51/2 Years. Now upon examining Miles Wilsons Receipts you will find that he entering upon his Farme at Ladyday 1731 pays 6 Years Rent to last Ladyday which is all that is realy due from him, 5 whereof has been paid to the Receivers & one to the late Mr Radcliffs Heirs, where as we apprehend only half a year should have been paid to the said Heirs. The Question then Seems to be Was the halfe Years Rent ending at Ladyday 1732 & due the Marts 1731 preceeding by the Tenure of the Lease of Old Park due to the Treasury or Mr Radcliffs Heirs, he dying in December 1731. If it is due to the latter then the Treasury and the Hospital together receive out of that Estate from the time of the Forfeiture only 5 Years rent to Ladyday last whereas in all other parts of the Estate they receive 51/2 Years Rent to last Ladyday.

As to the £29. 4s. 83/4d laid out in Repaires at Meldon park & Hartburn Grange it is true it Exceeds the Boards Order had it been laid out on one Tenement, but as it was laid out on three which are occupied by more than 3 Tennants we apprehend it to be within what the Board were pleased to Command & hope they will think so and approve thereof.

At the time of the Commission of Enquiry it would have been proper to have laid these (if they are fact) Charges against him and had they been so and made, appear to have been fact we don't apprehend he would have been continued in the Hospitals Service. We have a better Opinion of him than to believe him guilty of any Injustice & till it appears otherwise we must Support him in executing what he is Commanded to do.

We are not yet Informed that you have any right to Cutt Wood & if you do it without our Consent it may be of ill Consequence, therefore to prevent any further Inconvenience it will by no means be prudent to doe anything of that kind. We are farr from hindering You or anybody from having all the Priviledges You have right to, but till those things appear to be your right You will excuse us in doing what we believe to be Justice to the Hospital & we are

(The case is this) The poor man was farmer of the Mills for many Years, Built a Wind Mill at his own expence which not being able to keep in repair was blown down and renderd of no use to him and the other Mill having become ruinous and in bad repair he expended in the Years 173 and 1734 in the repaire thereof £12 - 9 – 6 which sum he begs may be Allowed him by the Directors, As to the fact of these repairs being done we have wrote to Mr Watson to Attest the same, and had his Answer which we send you Inclosd with the Accot. of the particulars of the said £12 : 9 : 6 [see Watson to Walton, 14 Dec 1737]

This poor fellow being a Mill Wright by Trade, we have Employd him in the late repairs of the Mill and other Repairs at Scremerston and there is Due to him upon that Accot. near £22 – 0 – 0 which sum he is Willing to Allow in part of his Debt as he is to allow the said £12 – 9 – 6 if the Directors are pleased to Order It to be Accounted in that way he is no way Capable of paying the Old Arrear but by Allowing him the Old repairs we think the Directors sho'd Comply therewith, but that we Submitt to their Direction.

The slow proceedings against Thomas Howden, Gren and others Tenants of haydon Town farm is realy such an Inconvenience to the Hospitals Affairs that I cannot help (after the Treatment I mett with yesterday) Accquainting you with It and beg It may be laid before the Board at their first meeting If you Judge It proper at that time, If not at the next Convenient time.

That Affair of Green and Howdens being Dropt at the last Assizes by the proceedings being Irregular, has hung in suspence over time and no other proceedings appeare to be made against them wich Occasions the World to Suspect the Tory party to Insinuate that we have no right to prosecute the Law against them, nay the Tenants whose Rents have been Advanced do not stick to say they see no reason for their very Advanced Rents when Green and Howden can maintain their pretended right against us, this is at present Insinuated and I wish it may not occasion too great trouble, I am sure nothing can prevent It but Imediate care being taken to prosecute the Law against all persons who Comitt such Offences.

This will Appear to you most Evident by one Instance in one of the old Tenants of Allerwash who Absolutely refuses to go off jis Farm, and now tells us that as we cannot turn Green and Howden off, he will by the same rule Maintain his right against us, and how farr these slow proceedings put people upon Committing will appear to you in another Instance – one Simon <Dryden> has an estate Joyning upon Grindon Comon and has ever since we have been Concernd Claimed a right of Graizing his cattle thereupon Notwithstanding it appears that he nor his predisessors ever had any rights at all, and we have always Threatened him with a prosecution, if he at any time put his cattle upon that Comon which he durst not presume to do, till last week, when our bailiff Mr Bunting impounded them and he has since Replevyd them so that we shall be obliged to give him Tryall. I have acquainted Mr Airey with this who will take proper Stepps about it which I hope the Board will approve of.

But to Shew you Further how the Hospital Affairs Suffer by these Slow proceedings and how the Creditt of the Directors as well as our Authority Suffers for want of Tenants Leases, I beg leave to relate to you hat I mett with Yesterday from one Lumley a Freeholder in Corbridge who came to me Solliciting our Concurrance in the Inclosing a part of Corbridge North Common, who after I had acquainted that I would not presume to agree without my principalls Concurrance he told me he very plainly see we had no right at all to agree to anything, either as to Granting Leases or many other Affairs. I believe this part of the Common may be proper enough to be Inclosed, and will be an Advantage for the Hospitals Tenants, but before anything is recommended of that kind to the Board, for this Consideration I beg leave to Consult my partner Mr Boag in it he being now from home.

Inclosed we send you Mr Thompsons Acco. of the Quantity of Common and Inclosed Lands surveyed for the Com[missione]rs of Greenwich Hospital, and his Debt and Credit Accot. with the Com[missione]rs by which there is a Balance of £58 – 4 – 8 due from the said Com[missione]rs. Inclosed you have also Mr Ellisons Draught of the Articles of Agreem't with Mr Thompson all which we give you the trouble of as he desires to wait upon you to inform you wherein he has suffered.

By the Agreem't, You will observe he undertakes to survey the whole of the estates (Scremerston Excepted) late belonging to James earl of Derwentwater in the Countys of Cumberland and Northumberland, and in Consideration of the extensive Comons which was to survey, he agreed to survey the Inclosed land at 2 ½ d per Acre.

When this article was Drawn we were abroad and on coming home, we found an Agreement was made with Mr Thompson, and he was orderd to begin at Alston Moore, which being Consented at that time by us to be about Forty thousand Acres, we recommended it to the Hospitall not to have it surveyd in regard that it would be a very great expense, upon which they ordered that it shoud not be surveyd till further order. Mr Thompson upon that began with Dilston and surveyd it, and all the Inclosed Lands which together amounts to 21614 Acres and 34 Perches and of commons 14157 Acres 3 Roods and 37 perches, by which small Quantity of Common Only being surveyd he says he is a Looser, for he says he woud not have undertaken the Survey of

the Ingrounds for less than 3d per acre had it not been out of a view of profit by the extensive Commons, which he says he always expected would be at least 40,000 Acres.

Now Sir if Mr Thompson out of a view of having 40,000 acres of common to survey accepted of 2 ½ d per acre on 21614 acres and 34 perches of Inground which otherwise he woud not have done under 3d per acre and when he comes to the survey he finds he has only to survey 14157 acres 3 roods and 37 perches of common, then according to that proportion he ought to be paid 2 ½ d per acre for 7650 acres of Inclosed Lands and 3d per acre for the remainder being 13964 acres and 34 perches so that instead of what he charges it woud stand thus

Upon being at Keswick lately we find Mr Thomas Jefferson has Carryed off his Customary Estate in the Manour of Thornthwaite a quantity of Birch and Alder Trees which he formerly sold William Moles who has paid him the Money he contracted to pay for the sd Birch and Alder Trees and Mr Jefferson has given him an Indemnity for his so doeing notwithstanding we apprehend he has no right to Cutt any wood without the Livence and Consent of the Lord of the Manour as we particularly represented to you in former letters. What we therefore desire is to know whether the directors think it proper to suffer this offence, or that they will be pleased to order such methods to be taken as the Law Directs to Compell the offender to doe Justice.

There is a mill at Keswick and a Dam Cross the River Greta for Conveying water to the Sd Mill, which by some late floods is broke down and wants repairing we have therefore given orders that it may be repaired with all speed to prevent making the breach wider and Consequently doeing much greater Damage which we hope the Directors will Approve of.

It also appears to us that Anth. Scott the Tenant of Stablehill is in very mean circumstances and not able to pay the Rent of the farme, therefore we have admitted Joseph Wilson & Joshua Scott, Tenants of the Sd. farme to Enter upon the same at ladyday Next and we have admitted John Goave & John Wilson Tenants of heads &

Lords Lands for one year Instead of Edwd. Waterson who has declined it both which we hope will be approved of by the Directors, at the present Rents.

There has been a Smelting house near Keswick at wch is Lying a Quantity of Copper & Lead Ore Slaggs which seem to be of very little value, but may be let so as to Raise profit to the Hospital. Mr Thomas Westgarth has proposed to take the same and pay a sixth in Lead or Copper of what shall be produced therefrom, which if the Directors have no Objection to we will let them on the best Termes we can.

Inclosed you have the Accot of Oare raised within the Man[or] of Alston moore from Mich last to Christmas last, as it was sent us by Mr Stephenson and you have also inclosed an Accot of the whole years produce of Ore within the Sd manor with the Dues thereof, and what they Amount to as they were sold Geo:Liddell Esqr & his Ptners.

The Tenants in all the parts of the Estate are So Uneasey for want of their Leases and repairing of their Housing that we are made intolerable uneasy about it, and they Absolutly refuse (some of 'em) to pay the advanced Rents till they have both. Mr Reed of Chipchase who is the farmer of Buteland and who is a Gentleman of the best Intrest in Elections in the County of Northumberland has wrote us that he cannot subsist with his under Tenants without [having] his Housing done against Next Mayday, that he has proposd to undertake the buildings himselfe in as Reasonable a way as any other person and that without his Housing is done so as to be ready for him against Mayday he will not pay the advance Rent. This we thought proper particulally to lay before you and desire that wee may have a speedy orders as is possable for the doeing Mr Reeds housing as well as all the others where Necessarry . We have a Rece[ip]t at Hexham on Monday & Tuesday the 20th & 21st Inst when Mr Reed is to be with us and it would be very well if we had full orders as to his buildings against that time, and if it could be done it wou'd be also well that we had directions in the Whole, as the time of the year is comming on to make preperations for the same.

In answer to yours about the Expence of Fewell &c for making bricks and Tyles at Dilston there is no charge of Fewell or any other thing Necessary for making bricks or Tyles but what is paid by John Skinn the undertaker who covenants with us to make bricks at 7s per thousand and Tyles at 23s per Thousand, he to find all materials, Fewell &c, but this agreemt is only from One year to Another. Inclos'd is our Cash Acct for last Month on which Remaines a balance of £54:14:5 ¼ in our favour who are

As your Call to London was upon so short Notice, which prevented your having so particular an accot. of the State & Condition of the Lead Mines, in this Manner as you intended we take this first opportunity of acquainting you thereof in as particular a manner as the nature of the thing will allow of in this way.

At Thorngill there has been sev[era]ll Old Shafts opened in order to Discover the Condition of that Mine, which is found in so poor Condition in the Upper Cills that a low Levell has been thought necessary to Win the Low Cills, It has been some time at work is now Drove about 120 yards and will Effectually Win all the Low Cills of that Mine.

<Goring> Gill Levell is also pursuing in the proper manner but is not yet finished and Lough vein is Sinking into the Low Limestone, in order to make a judgement whether a Lower levell than the present one is necessary or not. The present levell has been opened , and severall Shafts and Sumps opened since G L Esqr and his partners began work.

Nentsberry Haggs now raising a Small Quantity of Ore, a level having lately been Drove to loose some Deadwater and severall shafts has been sunk and opened too for the Convenience of working that mine.

At Blagill there has been severall Cross Cutts made as a preparation for getting ore, and it is now under consideration what other Methods may be most proper for the Effectual carrying on that Mine.

At Brownley hill there has been an old levell opened and a shaft has been also opened in order for getting ore.

There is a Levell carrying on to win Fair Hill and Redgroves at the Lowest levell that can be got, and from the same Levell, the Shaw, Peatstack hill Bright Burn & Dowgang will be all Effectually woan, it has been a great expence and will yet cost to winn all these mines £1000 or upwards there has been at Peatstack hill a New Shaft Sunk and sev[era]ll Sumps Sunk in order that the greatest Quantity of ore might be raised till the Low Levell be brought up to that mine.

There has been sev[era]ll shafts and a Levell opened at Carrs and Cowslitts in order for getting ore and the necessary steps are taking for working these mines.

There has been a Levell Drove at the East End of Longhole head and sevll. Shafts sunk, one whereof upon the vein, which is now Trying in order to get ore and a Sump is intended to be sunk into the low Cills to try these also.

A Levell is pursuing towards the west end of Longhole head and severall shafts has been opened thereon, this Levell has been great expence, has cost in some parts £3-10-0 per fathom and is now Driving at 57s/6d per Fathom.

A Levell is pursuing towards Browngill which will winn not only that mine but Thortergill and Browngill Moss it is about 600 yards in length and will cost abt. £500 there has been sevll. Shafts also opened to try the workings in Browngill Mine which Discovered an overcharge of water and consequently could not be wrought without the above mentioned Levell which will be an effectual Winning.

Some time agoe the Board of Directors for Greenwich Hospitall were pleased to Order an Action to be brought against one Carrick for taking away by force a cow which had been Levyd and taken away from him by the Bayliff of Alston Manor and sold by him to one Furnace from whom the cow was taken by Carrick.

Carricks pretence for taking away the cow, was that she was taken without the manor, and therefore Mr Simpson thought it proper to use means to procure a Release from him to Wm Lee the Bayliff and then to proceed against him for takeing away the cow which he accordingly did, during which Transaction Furnace Dyd, and Mr Simpson being unwilling to Proceed in the name of his Exe[cu]tors without having Councills Opinion, we Agreed that he should take an Opinion upon it, and During that time Carrick has brought Actions Against the persons in Company with the Bayliff when he Levyd. I had a Ltter the 5th Instant from Mr Simpson on this Affair which I send you Inclosed with a Copy of the Opinion he took, and as the Establishing of the Court seems intirely to Depend upon our success in making an Example of this offender, I gave Mr Simpson for answer that the Defend[an]t should be justifyd which I hope the Board will approve off.

As Mr Boag can inform you, the Winter Floods has Done a good Deal of Damage amongst the Wears at Fourstones and the Damage is greatly increased by a very great Flood we had last week. I have had it viewed by John Bell who is a very juditious man, and he acquaints me it will cost at least £60 to repair it I have also seen it my self and think it will scarce be done for that sum. However there is a Necessity for the Breach being made good, the sooner the Board are pleased to give their direction the better, for it will Daily grow worse.

I am like to be tore in peices by the Derwentwater Ten[an]ts for want of their Housing being put forward to repair, and least the season should be left for cutting down wood for those repairs, so as the Bark shoud be lost I beg leave to put you in mind of it, That the Directors may Consider it, and while Mr Boag is in Town, give such Orders as they think necessary and convenient relating thereto. The Contents of which I have Communicated to Mr Boag my partner and in Answer we are glad to se[e] Mr Richardson is Sensible of his fault and that he is ready to make you any Satisfaction for the Loss you have Sustained.

You are very kind in saying you will do nothing in this affair but what we shall approve of and you may be very well assured of our doing everything on our power to

support yours and the Hospitalls Title. The Hospital has been Acquainted with the Affair, to which we have had no answer but we are Satisfyd they will highly Resent the Affront to you, as well as themselves, And as we have not their Resolutions upon it we cannot say they will Approve of making the matter up, However as Mr Richardson seems so desirous of having an end made of the Affair, Mr Boag and I will use our Interest with the Hospital to forgive this fault: the offence they have Comitted is against you particularly in the Law the Goods they waisted being yours, so that whatever Agreem[en]t you make must be an Act of Your Own, and by doing it in the way it is proposed it will answer the purpose, that is Mr Richardson to pay you full damages for the Loss you sustaind to pay all Charges and Acknowledge the fault by an Instrum[en]t under his hand, in which Instrumt. In answer to Mr Maules Letter of the 5 July last, relating the Survey of the Derwentwater Estate we waited upon Collonel Liddell, & shewed him that part wch he was desired to explain, which he promised us he woud write to you about this post, & doubt not but he has done so, to wch we begg leave to referr.

As to what Mr Maule required of us to Explain, we have Inclosed sent you an Accot. Coppyd from what we made up Mr Thompsons Accot. from, in which you will observe we took a great deal of pains to distinguish the Commons, from the Ingrounds, by the alterations we made from the field Book, which we hope will give satisfaction to the Board.

Mr Richardson with whom the Hospitall has a dispute about a piece of Common in Alston Moore in wch the vein called Clargill Cleugh lyes, sent up five persons to Burn some Turbery wch was cast upon that piece of Common by one Mr Thos Whitfield as Freeholder within the Manour, who were taken by Mr Whitfield & Carryed by him before a Justice of the Peace for the County of Cumberland, on Monday the 17 July last, one of wch 5 persons made his Escape & the other four was bound over to the next Sessions, Mr Richardson having Enterd into a recognizance for their appearance. Since wch Mr Whitfield writes us, that he has had a letter from Mr Richarson desiring he will not goe on with the prosecution & promising he will make any satisfaction for the damage he has done, & give up any further Claim to the Common in dispute. To this we have given answer that we do not know whether the Direct[or]s will think fitt to accept of any acknowledgement other than giving up any Claim to the Common in dispute by an Instrument under his hand wch if he agrees to we hope it may putt an end to any further dispute in that Affair. The undivided Lands in Corbridge amounting to 667 acres is all Inclosed & Improved Land, having been in various sort of Tillage time out of Mind, & therefore should be reckoned Inngrounds. All the Land in Corbridge lies either interspersed in Ridges, or what is no way divided, but all has been improv'd many years. There is besides Moor or Waist belonging to Corbridge in which all the Freeholders have a right & the Duke of Somersett is Lord, and it was that Moor or Waist as well as the Inclosed land of Corbridge lying in Common or Ptnership wch we recommended to be divided. But you must observe that no Moore or Waist belonging to Corbridge was Surveyed. I hope this will Clear it up to you & that you will make your report so soon as you conveniently can, that Mr Thompson may be paid.

Mr Boag having been abroad for about a Week. I have deferred answering your last Letter, and he is yet abroad tho' expected him home yesterday Evening & by that means I cannot describe to you the Place at Darnhall where the Borer is to begin; he was with me last night & tells me he knows the place very well & as he has his full directions what to doe, will now loose no time, he has had a job to doe which kept him longer than he expected but being now entirely at your service he intends being at Darnhall next Monday Evening.

He will want a Roll & Rope & about a dozen fir Deales, which are to be furnished at your Expence, I desire you will therefore order some peson there to furnish him with what he wants he will take care to be as frugall as he can. I have given himDirections if he meets with anything Worth acquainting you with to write to you himselfe & to send me a Weekly accot. of the severall Soils and Metals he goes thro', by which we shall judge of the Prospect. I heartily wish it may succeed.

Mr Boag having been abroad above a Week I cannot tell what is done further about the Lead Mine, but I expect it is taken for us at a Tenth Duty. It lyes about 60 or 70 miles North from hence. Most certain it will be proper to have an Article of Partnership in order to regulate the Expence & to prevent any misunderstanding, which may happen, but I hope we never shall have any in that or any other Affair, however as an Article is absolutely necessary you shall have a Draught of a Ptnership Article sent you as soon as it can be done.

Sir

We recd. yours with the Boards Minutes of the 26 August last and Mr Aireys bill of law charges amounting to Forty one pounds fourteen shill. And nine pence which shall be payd pursuant to the Boards commands.

We have waited upon Lawyer Gray to know what his Expectations are for the trouble he has had in the Hospitalls Affaires, but he is unwilling to name any thing, but desires the Directors may order whatever they think proper. He was Consulted in & drew the Bill to be brought into Parliament, overagain after he had perused that which we had drawn by Mr Radley & he also Corrected the Land Leases, & drew George Liddell Esqrs Lead Mine Lease in its first shape, & he has been Consulted by us on Severall Affaires besides relating the Hospitall. The Board were pleased to order the Business Mr Gray did with regard to the Bill, the Land Lease, & Lead Mine Lease themselves in which he had a food Deal of trouble & Spent a good deal of his time but the other Consultations have been trifling tho' of great use for our Government. We think he may deserve twenty Guineas for the trouble he has had, but humbly submit it to the Consideration of the Board.

Inclosed is our Contingent payment for three Months ending 30 June last, amounting to £23.3.10 which we hope the Board will approve off. Inclosed is our Cash Accot. also for last Month, on which remains a balance of £58-15-1 in the Hospitalls favour. And inclosed is allso a Coppy of a Bond Enterd into by C Ricardson & a Note to pay the damages he did by burning Mr Whitfields peats.

You will Observe, he Enters into a Bond under the Penalty of £80, quitting Claim to the disputable part of the Common in Alston Moore & setts forth the Boundary as it ought to be, but notwithstand[in]g that as his father is in poss[essi]on of the Estate under which he claimed the Bond he has given will we apprehend be of no use in strengthening the Hospitalls Title. We have Consulted Mr Grey on this Affair & he advises that the Hospitall may proceed in filing a Bill to perpetuate the Testimony to their boundary for that he is of opinion that Mr Ricardson will in his answer acknowledge the boundary in the manner it is described by his son which if he does will answer all the ends we propose by perpetuat[in]g the Evidence.

I Reced. yours of the 21st Inst Inclosing me the Board Minutes at Salters Hall the 20th & those of a General Court at Greenwich the 21st Inst, & also your letter to Cuthbert Constable Esqr Inclosing the Minute relating paying off the Incumbrances on the Derwentwater Estate, which I sent by a Special messenger to Mr Constable, who will I expect returne this evening.

I was at Keswick the 15 inst & 16th receiving the half years Rent of the Demesne Lands due at Last Penticost, but found Phineas Mark the Farmer of the Tolls had been broke and gone off a week before. There was due from him last Mayday £7-10-0 & will be due next Mart[inmas] the like, and 20 shillings for Rent of a shop, parts of which will be lost. I have taken care to secure all I can, & I hope the Loss will not be great.

I find the Tennants within the mannor of Derwentwater Castleridge & Thornthwait Expect a call will be made upon them for the Rents and fines due from the Customary & Arbitrary estates, but before expect a Court will be held, to Admitt them Tennants to the King, which to be sure is necessary before the fines are payd. Upon Mr Woods application to us we laid the Affair before the Board & acquainted them from time to time with the proceedings as farr as we knew, and after they had made many Enquirys into the same; approved of the Countenance we had given Mr Wood. After Mr Airey was deputed Court keeper, he was advised with upon it, who advised it would be proper to remove the Suit into the Ecclesiastical Court of York, in case Mr Wood was defeated at Durham, which happening to be our case, the same was laid before the Board, who directed that the Suit shoud be removed according as Mr Airey advised. In answer to yours of the 26th Inst we yesterday waited upon Mr Airey and acquainted him with what you wrote, relating the severall ways proposed for dispatching the Tenants Leases on the Derwentwater Estate for as he is not only a judge of any Inconveniences that might Attend some of the Methods proposed, but in expectation of having a Share of the profits we thought it very proper to have his advise.

It is quite equall to us where they are drawn, provided they are done equally advantagious to the Hospital, with equall expedition & at the same expence but we are apprehensive none of these points will be so well executed at London as here, nay the Draughts must inevitably all be done here, if they are allowed to be Ingrossed in London, And that will loose a great deal of time. As to the printing of them, we are all of opinion it cannot be done as there is various circumstances in the severall farmes which will differ so as no blanks can be left to answer them.

The proffits which may arise from the Tenants leases Mr Airey and we have agreed upon and as Mr Corbetts Clerk Mr Horne expects and must have a share the whole as we have fixed it, provided Mr Radley & Mr Horne agrees thereto will be in 5 shares vizt Mr Airey, Mr Radley, & Mr Horne each one & we to have two shares, We dare venture to say there will be no comparison between the Expence of Drawing in London & the Country, & it is scarce to be disputed, but the Country will be much the

Cheaper, & as we will take care to have 'em done in the Cheapest way, we hope Mr Radley will come into it & allow them to be done here.

A Copy of the Attorney & Solicitor generals Opinion about the Derwentwater Leadmine Lease 26 Oct 1738

We have perused this draught and the Acts of Parliament proposal, Sign Manuels and Resolutions of the gen Court referrd to our consideration, And we are of Oppinion that the Draught is conformable to the Directions of the Act of Parliamt. in all the particulars thereby required and the covenants therein incerted are proper so farr as falls within the reach of our judgement, And we likewise think it is agreeable to the proposal, AnExcept that no Notice is taken in the Draught of that part of the proposal which relates to the Lessees purchasing the Duty Ore but we have not incerted any Clause for that purpose as not knowing whether it will be for the Intrest of the Hospital, or upon what Terms it is to be effected. But whether the Dues herein reserved are the best that can reasonably be gotten or whether so extensive a Lease is most for the Intrest of the Estate, or whether there are all the covenants from the Lessees that the Nature of these leases requires in the Severall Countrys where the Mines Lie (as they are matter no way within our knowledge) we cannot take upon us to Determine, and therefore can give no opinion whether in these respects it is advisable for the Commiss[ion]ers to Grant this Lease or Not.

Opinion proceed from any Difficulty Mr Att. & Mr Sollistor General may have of Approving what is proposed to be done by the Genl. Court as in any degree contrary to their judgement or merely from a Caution of not giving an Opinion in Matters which are of such a nature as it is Impossable to suppose they they can be versed in, and Unreasonable to expect any posative opinion upon.

Answer

The Doubts Expressed in our Opinion did not proceed from any Difficulty we had from Approving what is proposed to be done by the Genl. Court as in any Degree contrary to our judgements. But the Question put to us by the Resolution of the 29 Sept last being whether [underscored: 'upon consideration of the whole'] the Lease proposed was advisable for the Commiss[ioner]s to grant, We thought it proper upon so Complicated a question to Distinguish between what fell within the Compass of our profession and not, And the Doubts now Inquired after arose from our Caution in not giving an opinion in matters which from their nature we could not possably be supposed to be versed in, or give any positive opinion upon.

As the Collonels Lead Mine Lease is now Executed, we hope will open a way for the poor Tennants Leases soon to follow. They have been in great agonie about them and many never expect to see one in this part of the world. However as we hope they will soon be convinced to the contrary, we think proper to order for their dispatch, to lay before you the following proposal, whereby we hope, the greatest dispatch will be made, & the greatest profits accrue to us all.

We have been informed it has been proposed, to have all these Leases print'd, & to leave blanks for the Pcells, and different covenants, a thing which we can no way think practicable, for it is impossible to doe it unless all circumstances of Farmes were alike, which cannot be supposed to be the case in an Estate so very Extensive as the Derwentwater Estate is, for it is well known that even in Estates, even joyning one upon another the customs differ greatly. These are the Reasons we have to give against their being printed, & hope they are such as will joyn your sentiments in order to lay aside that scheme.

This therefore being the case it remaines to consider in what way they can be best drawn, and engross'd, at the Easiest Expence & with the most Expedition, Now in order to this we think in the first place all the Draughts must be made here or at least the most of them, which must be transmitted to you, if they are Engrossed in London, which will take up a great deal of time, & give a great deal of trouble, and as you will we think haveno profit in the Engrossing of them, it seems all respects most

convenient to have 'em done here as they will be done at the following Expences. Drawing 5s engrossing 2 parts 8/4d & Parchment & Duty 5s, in all 18/4d a pair, nay we hope something may be saved in the Drawing as in some places Farmes will be equally circumstanced & no alteration but in the Pcells.

We do not propose this Sir as a thing any way to interfere with your Interest, but as a thing of mutual benefit to us all who expect to have shares in the Profitts, & that the business may be dispatch'd with all the Expedition the Nature of the thing will allow. If we are mistaken in any thing, or that you think Mr Aireys prices too high, pray lett us know your sentiments, as we will be govern'd by you in anything which seems mutually advantagious.

We have had in the letting of the Estate an intolerable deal of trouble & very great Expence, which the Hospitall have never made us any allowance for, which is a reason why we may expect more than a quarter part of the profits by these leases. It was originally intended to be between You, Mr Horne & us, but Mr Airey who is concerned in the Affair expecting a share will make it to us all of less Vallue, We hope for the reasons above we may be thought by you & Mr Horne not unreasonable in proposing the division of the Profitt to be into five parts, that is You, Mr Horne, Mr Airey and we two each one fifth, for besides the great trouble we have had, we shall yett have a great deal & be putt to Considerable Expence.

It is a Custom in this Country that the Landlord & Tennant bear the Expence of Leases equally & the prices of 'em are general two Guineas a pair, but whether that should be a standard for us or not we cannot tell, you will therefore consider it with Mr Horne & let us know your joynt thoughts. It should also be represented to the Hospitall that one half of the expence will be upon them, so as they may give Consent thereto, & prevent any misunderstanding about it hereafter.

The Comm[issioner]s of the Royal Hospital for Seamen at Greenwich having had several Complaints of several Trespasses & Violences by you & your Accomplices Committed and of great damage thereby done to the Colliery called Tarret Burn of highgreen & Blackburn in the parish of Simonburn in Northumberland, now in the possession of & worked by James Dodds of Smiddiwell Rigg & of several persons being threatned obstructed & Ill Intreated who have fetched Coales from th pitts there, in order to prevent Mr Dodds disposing of his Coales or having any benefits from the same; which in the Consequence is a great Setriment to the Comm[issioner]s of the Hospital who are Intitled to the profits of these collierys by act of Parliament and have Ordered me to Acquaint you that they will Direct you to be severely prosecuted for the Injurys and wrongs by you already done, if you doe not Immediately after this Notice forbear to Commit any others and permit Mr Dodds to worke the said Collierys quietly & without any Interrupcon for the Future.

If any Detriments is done to you by keeping you out of any Rights or Interests you legally have or Claim in these collierys it would be more agreeable to Represent it in a proper manner to the Comm[issoner]s of the Hospital who would consider it with as much Equality and Justice as is possible, and if it should appear you had any Legall Rights or Colour of Rights therein would I dare answer for them adjust the Difference in an amiable way or put it in [....] to be tryed at law or otherwise as Councill shall advise. But the Methods you practise (as the Commrs are Informed and by good proof

I do not doubt will appear to be too true) are Certainly very unjustifyable the Law abhorring [force] and hope you from the many ill consequences that attend it will dislike and forbear doing any violences hereafter and if you have any Claim in Law you will prosecute it in such a manner, as it may be determined by the Law of the Land, & cease doing any unwarrantable acts of force or wrong for the future.

The Arrear of Rent due from Mr Blackett at Martinmas 1734 was return'd to the Comm[issioners] of Greenwich Hospitall by the late Rec[eive]rs amongst severall other arrears, a Schedule whereof was sent to us, in order that we might receive them, & pursuant to the order we had, Mr Blacketts arrear was demanded by us, of Mr Ellis who pay'd it by our direction to Mr Bunting our Bailiff & he accounted for it to us the 31 December 1737, on which day it was brought to Accot. by us with the Commrs. Of the Hospitall, being part of £9 ---d then recd in the following words

1737 Decemr 31 To Walter Balckett Esq reced of him from Mr Ellis in full for Rent of sams Island due at Mayday 1737 £9

You will please to observe that the Suit for the recovery of this arrear was commenced while Mr Grieve was Sherriff, & on his applycation to us we acquainted him it was pay's, & then proceedings was stop'd or at least in all this time we heard no more of it. If this trouble we have had in it be occasioned by any Fee not being pay'd I hope Mr Richmond will give directions to see them discharged, as to be sure any expence that has accrued has been by no neglect of ours.

We have wrote this day to the Sec[reta]ry of the Hospitall to satisfy Mr Denton or any person that apply to him of this money being pay'd which I hope will be sufficient on our part & prevent any further trouble to Mr Blackett or to Sir Your Most Hble Sert

Honrd Sir,

We reced Yours of the 6th Inst and are sorry to find you have so much Trouble about the Survey of the Derwentwater Estate, with regard to the Gratification for Isaac Thompson, as he had not the Benefitt by Surveying the Commons.

We have gone thro' all that has been said about it to us and the Letters we have wrote to the Board & cannot find we had any Direction to make the Agreement with Mr Thompson, nor does it appear that ever an Agreement was made by the Directors for Surveying the Inngrounds only. We have also got of Mr Ellison what letters he had from you relating the Survey & his answer to you setting forth the conversation he had with Mr Thompson upon the Treaty & as follows you have a Transcript of the whole as farr as is material wth our Remarks thereon,

1735 Nov 19th

Mr Corbett acquaints us that the Directors are [underscored: 'willing to agree'] with Mr Isaac Thompson to Survey the Estate Inngrounds and Commons together to Map the Same in a Folio Book with vellum leaves, a farme or Small estate in a Sheet or Leafe, the said Maps to contain the Buildings, Rivers, Brooks, Roads, Pitts, Quarries & other Remarkables & to have a Field Book with the value and quantity and a Duplicate of the whole to be made in Quarto for two pence per acre, the Charge of the Books to be defray'd by the Hospital.

You will observe Sir by this Minute the Directors are [underscored: 'willing to agree'] which we understand it means no more than a power for you to agree on these terms, so that as no Agreement appears to hve been made in pursuance of it, the repeating it the 3 December invests you with a power to agree for the Inngrounds at 2 ½ d per acre.

1735 Dec 4th

In yours to Mr Ellison you say 'I shall have the Court of Directors Orders to agree with Mr Thompson at 2 ½ d per acre for Inngrounds maps &c in case we doe not survey the commons & if we doe then 1 ½ d per acre for them, or to be in the option of the commissioners to have the whole done at 2 pence, both Inlands & Commons, if they think it better so that it shall be in their option which to take.

1735/6 Janry 6th

Thomas Corbett Esqr. writes to N.Walton & adds a Postscript, & says 'You will doe well to quicken Mr Thompson in the Survey of the Estates, which is very much wanted to be done as soon as possible. The Agreement with him is that he is to survey all the Inngrounds of the Estate (Except Scremmerston which he has done already, and to Map the same in a Folio Book with Vellum Leaves, a Farm, or Small Estate in a sheet or Leafe the said Maps to Contain the Buildings Rivers Brooks Pitts quarries & other Remarkable things, and to have a Field Book with the Vallue & Quantity; & a Duplicate of the whole to be made in Quarto at $2\frac{1}{2}$ d per acre, the Charge of the Books to be defrayed by the Hospital.

You will be pleased to observe Sir that here is an order to quicken Mr Thompson in the Survey, but no order to make any agreement with him, nay on the contrary he says an agreement was made, wch was not in fact so as will appear, by your letter of this date to Mr Robert Ellison, which we quote as follows.

1735/6 Janry 6th

You say 'Mr Corbett writes to their Receivers at Keswick & orders them to agree with Isaac Thompson, for Surveying th Estate & writ to them to send you that order. But as it may loose time & as I question whether it may be so fully expressed I therefore send you inclosed, Mr Corbetts Letter to me in Novrlast, & a Minute of his Conference

and mine upon it on what Terms he was willing to doe it if the Commissioners agreed to it which they doe only Incert that he shall putt the Valuation to the several parcells or sorts of land in each Farm or Estate, wch he did not then agree to as you see by my Minute, he alledging he was not a Judge of the value of Land in such distant parts of the Country. But I think he might considering the Quantity afford to pay a Judicious man for doing it; or pay a Certain Sum & we appoint the Valuers. Pray will you treat with him & observe that you do not run into an Error and mistake one another. In the Minute it is said that he will map the Inngrounds at 2½ d & the Commons if Desired at 1 ½ d so that it wou'd seem prima Facie that he was to have 2½ d for all that he surveyed except Common, but that was not my meaning nor his as I think I can demonstrate. He Surveyed Scremmerston for which he had 2d per Acre wch estate was 1100 Acres of Ingrounds & 1800 Acres of Outgrounds which he calls Moore, I take it in most of the estates, there are Inngrounds, Outgrounds & Moors – If he Surveys the Inngrounds & Outgrounds if not clearly Express'd he will have 2½ d per Acre for both wch I do not think wou'd be right, for where open Grounds are only Rounded with the Chain it shou'd only be 1½ d I think, but pray talk to him on that Subject & lett me know.'

Now Sir by this Letter of yours and the Words Scored under it is palin no agreement was then made by the Directors or You, but that Mr Ellison was to Transact it with Mr Thompson & acquaint you with his proceedings thereon, wch it will afterwards appear he did & acquainted you with it accordingly.

1735/6 Janry 8th

You say in your Letter to Mr Robert Ellison 'That Mr Thompson will undertake to Survey the whole of the Derwentwater Estates & to Map in a Book of Folio Vellum & in another of Quarto Vellum or Thick paper, & to make a Field Book to each Book containing Buildings Rivers &c at $2\frac{1}{2}$ d per Acre, & also the Commons if desired at $1\frac{1}{2}$ d per Acre. The whole to be exactly Surveyed and Map'd after the best manner. There is also one thing to be explain'd. He said what he offered to doe it for, was cheaper than he had ever done for any one whereas he Surveyed Scremmerston which was only 948 Acres & 1900 of Moore, & he had for the whole 2d per Acre. The 1900 I think is out pasture or Moore, if therefore he were to have Surveyed it again by the aforesaid Minutes at $2\frac{1}{2}$ d and $1\frac{1}{2}$ d then I agree it wou'd be cheaper but by the above Minute

We Reced yours with the Boards Minutes of the 6th Instant which we duely observe, but Scremmerston Colliery lying at so great a distance cannot this post acquaint you with the occasion of her being sett on Fire: we have wrote to be informed of it, and as soon as we can will lett you know.

We do not find by any Copy of Letter or other Memorandum that we acquainted Mr Thompson with the postscript of the secretarys Letter dated the 6th January 1735 But we believe we did. We never understood that postscript carryd the sense of Surveying the Ingrounds only; - for tho' he is said to Survey the Ingrounds at $2\frac{1}{2}$ d per Acre he never offerd to do them under 3d per Acre and therefore we understood it and still do understand it to imply no more than the price Intended to be given him for Inground when surveyd with Commons jointly and that the Stress of this Minute was to Inforce the Survey of the Ingrounds first, so as the proper use might be made of it.

At the time the above Minute as made it is certain no Agreement was made with Mr Thompson, for it appears plain there was not from a Letter of Mr Robert Ellisons of the 16th Janry following to Geo:Liddell Esqr who had given Mr Ellison direction to make the Agreement and Draw an Article in pursuance of it. That part of the Letter which relates to the agreement we have from the Copy here Transcribed for the satisfaction of the Board as follows. In obedience to your Commands of the 8th Inst I have here transmitted the Draught of an Article with Isaac Thompson for the Survey of the Derwentwater Estate which I wish may be Drawn in such form as to meet with your Approbation. At the beginning of it I would have inserted that he shou'd undertake to survey the whole or any such part of the estates as he shou'd from time to time be Directed, But to this he objected as he might thereby be obliged to do all the troublesome part of it only and that his offer to you at the severall prices of 2½ d & 1½ d per acre was in consideration of having what was beneficiall as what was not and as I presume the Hospital will think proper to have a general Survey of the whole, I struck at the words he Desired me further to observe to you Sir, that for the more exact Computation of the Quantity he intends to survey by a scale of four chains to an inch which must be afterwards contracted to bring into the folio Book and a second time for

the Quarto book which will cost him a great deal of pains and was it not for Advantage of surveying the whole Estate he could not possibly undertake it at so low a rate.

This we Believe was the agreement with Mr Thompson and no Doubt Colonel Liddell acquainted the Directors with it tho' probably it might not be at any Boards meeting which occasions it not being Minuted. We are satisfied Mr Thompson always understood it so and we do assure you it was always so understood by Sir &c

[Note: The law charges account referred to was copied into this volume a few pages earlier, but given here in conjunction with the covering letter. The basis for this case, concerning the right of Moor to claim payment in lieu of tithes from Wood, is described in Wood's petition to the Hospital 20 November, 1735. Wood had been tenant to the Hospital at East Thornton in Hartburn parish and was supported by the Hospital through the legal proceedings. The initial problem resulted from the actions of the previous receivers, Watson & Hutchinson, and their corrupt bailiff Ralph Readhead. Wood lost his case in the Durham ecclesiastical court and an appeal was heard in York. The sender is not named but assumed here to have been Nicholas Walton.]

We have rid the Boundary & taken the Examination of Severall Witness in relation to the Dispute, & have likewise procured a Assignment of a Lease of this Colliery, from the Derwentwater family; by which we shall be able to prove, the quiet & peaceable injoym.t of high Stublock Colliery upwards of 40 Years. This we have acquainted Mr Blacketts Agent with, & we have hopes he will give up their Claim, & referr the dispute to two Indifferent persons in which we desire the Board will be pleased to give us their Instructions.

We observe the Boards order to Mr Radley, relating the Tennants Leases which he acquainted us with the last Post, & which we will most readily comply with but as we apprehend the Method Mr Radley proposes, will be attended with some Inconveniencies, & very material ones; we begg leave to lay such Inconveniencies before the Board for their Consideration.

Now if this Intended gallery be taken up entirely by other subscribers, there can be no proper place for such a Family afterwards wherefore I heartily wish that the Commissioners may be Apprized of this opportunity, and prevaild upon to Contribute for the front seat (which will be about 12 Feet in length, made wider than the back Seats, and project a little before the rest in the Middle of the Church and of something better work. I am of opinion that about seven ponds or £7.10 – will make this provision, and if the Commis[sioners] Agree to it, the Contribution may be either in money, or

Copy of the Case relating to the holding the Court Leets of Alston Moor & Wark &c part of the Estates forfeited by the Attainders of James late Earl of Derwentwater & Charles Radcliffe, and of Mr Attorney General's Opinion thereon.

At the respective Court Leets, & Court Baron's, lately held for the Manor of Alston Moore in the County of Cumberland and the Manor of Wark in the County of Northumberland (part of the late Derwentwater Estate) Some Presentments were made by the Leet Jury and Homage of the Severall Courts against some of the Tennants of the said Man<o>rs for Surcharging the Commons with their Cattle & other defaults & Trespasses as in the annex'd Extract mentioned who were amerced for the same w.ch Amerciaments the Bailiffs of the said Manors have demanded but the Tennants so Amerced refuse to pay them, and Threaten to bring Actions against them if they Levy.

Some of the Amerciaments are inconsiderable in Value but it is represented by the Stewards of the said Courts that it will tend much to the Peace & Quiet of the Tenants of the said Manors to oblige the said Tenants so amerced to pay them; The Method generally used to Levy these Amerciaments has been by Distress; But the Bayliffs being now apprehensive if they do, The Tenants on whom they shall be so levyed will sue them at Law, and therefore are unwilling to distrain.

The Court Leets and Court Barons for the said Manors have always been holden on the same day and the same Jurors Sworn both for the Leet and the Homage, and the Jurys make their presentm<en>ts under the Style of the Courts (as below) without Distinguishing whether they relate to the Court Leet or Court Baron, and the Amerciaments which they Impose are affirmed in Court.

Sometimes the Lords of the said Manors have heretofore distrained and Sometimes brought Actions of Debt for the Recovery of them.

The Stile of the Court of Alston Moor is thus.

If it will not be better for the future to alter the Method of holding these Courts, and to Impanell two Several Jurys, one for the Leet and the other for the Homage, or if it be thought fit to continue the Jury in the manner as has been hitherto used (to make one Jury Serve both for the Leet and Homage) will it not be proper to direct such Jury to make their Presentments under the Style of the respective Courts they relate to.

I think it will be adviseable to hold the Courts distinct for the future and Impanel distinct Jurys for Such Courts who should make their Presentments under the Style of Such Court .

Whether is it better to Distrain for the Amerciaments, or to bring Actions for them; if more proper to bring Actions, what kind of Actions, and in what Court will it be proper to bring them, the King being now Lord of the Manor.

The best Method of recovering the Amerciaments is by Distress which is of Common Right for the Amerciaments in the Court Leet, and by what is stated, there seems to be a Custom to Justifye it for those in the Court Baron.

By an Act passd in the last Session of Parliament intitled an Act for Explaining and amending an Act of the Eighthyear of this present Majestys Reign Intitled an Act for the application of the Rents and profitts of the Estates forfeited by the Attainders of James late Earl of Derwentwater and Charles Radcliffe; the said Estates are Continued vested in his present Majesty his heirs & Success<ors> & the Rents Issues & Profits thereof are appropriated for the use and benefit of the Royall Hospitall for Seamen at Greenwich according to the Directions of the said Act, Subject to such incumbrances as are Contained in the said Act.

And Whereas the said premises being by the said last mentioned Act, vested as aforesaid in his Majesty his heirs & succ[ess]ors in his politick Capacity which in Consideration of Law never dyes, It may Create a Doubt whether the Tenants of the said estates ought to do such Acts and Services and py such Fines & Sums of Money on the Death of his present Majesty (whom God long preserve for the benefit of his

people) or on the death of any future King or Queen of this Realm as by the nature & tenure of their Estates founded upon immemorial Usage and Customor otherwise they ought to have done and performed and paid on the death of any Lord thereof, in Case Such Lord was a Subject. It is Enacted that upon the death of his present Majesty and also upon the death of every Successive King and Queeen of this Realm all such Acts & Services shall be done & performed & all such Fines & Sums of Money shall be paid by the respective Tenants of the said Estates to every Successor of his Majesty, or in case any of the said Estates shall be sold to such other persons who shall be the Owner thereof as by the Ancient tenure thereof or by any Contract, Law Usage, or Custom ought to be done performed and paid by them in Case such King or Queen so dying was Considered as a private person only, & not in his or her politick Capacity, and for default of performance of such Acts & Services which ought so to be done and performed, and for default of payment of any such Fines and Sums of Money which ought so to be paid such forfeitures & Penaltys shall accrue & become Due & it shall be Lawfull for his Majesty his heirs & succ<ess>ors and for all and every Person & Persons by him or them appointed, or who shall be then Owner of the said Estates or any of them to use & take all such Ways & means for Recovering & taking advantage of the said forfeitures & penaltys as might be Lawfully used or taken by any Lord of the said Estates in Case such King or Queen so dying was Considered as a private person only & not in his or her Politick Capacity any Law Usage or Custom to the Contrary notwithstanding All which said Fines & Sums of Money Penaltys & forfeitures which shall accrue and become due to his Majesty his heirs & succ<ess>ors during his & their Interest therein shall be applyed to & for the use & benefit of the Royall Hospitall for Seamen at Greenwich.

And Whereas in the manor of Derwentwater Castleridge & Thornthwait (part of the said Estates) some of the Tenants pay Customary fineable Rents; and on the death of every Lord thereof a Generall admitting Fine is also due, and one part of the said Fines are fourpenny fine Certain reserved & made payable by Indentures, and the other part thereof Arbitrary, nd whether any fine can be due upon the Death of James late Earl of Derwentwater for the Admission of any of those Tenants to their Estates, some of them now make a doubt by reason the said james was attainted & Executed, and did not (as they say) dye a naturall death, and therefore Object against paying the same

If any fine is due to his Majesty the present admitting Lord from these Tenants for their respective admissions to their estates on the death of the said James late Earl of Derwentwater, altho' he was attainted & Executed as aforesaid, and if so may not such fines & Sums of Money as by the Ancient Tenure of their Estates, or by any Contract Law Usage or Custom ought to be paid be Assessed and Levyed or such of them as refuse to pay the same on their respective admissions.

Inclosed is 4 Affidavits made by four Severall persons in relation to the Dispute likely to happen between Mr Blackett & the Hospital, about high Stublock Colliery, as also an Eye Map of the Colliery & Common in dispute for the Boards better Information. The Affidavits are Originals, and therefore Care shoud be taken of them as they will be wanted if there is a Tryal; Mr Blacketts Lessees are working now in the Ground in Dispute and will not take any Discharge .

I have seized by Distress the Goods of John Corbett of Allerwash, some of which I have sold; and for the remaining part, he has given Security for Payment of what he owed the Hospital to be paid 6 Months after, & he has also quitt possession, so that we are now quite Clear of him, & that Dispute is at an End.

I Seized also the Goods of Bridget Horsman of Corbridge, who held over against the Hospital on pretence that she had her House and Garth given her, by some of the Derwentwater Family, and she now Offers to Attorn Tennant to the Hospital, if they will be pleased to forgive her all the arrear to last Mayday which is £10.5s, and will pay annually 10s for the said House & Garth. I have postpon'd the Sale of her Goods till the Boards pleasure therein be known. The House & Garth was in the old Rentall £1.10s a year but at the general Leasing which Commenved Mayday 1737, it has been only in the Rentall at £1 a year there having only been that sum bidd for it upon the Advertizing.

This Woman is poore and I verily beleive, had the Estate continued in the Derwentwater family, they wou'd not have taken any Rent of her, she is a great Zealott in that Communion, please to lay her Case before the Board to know whether I shall accept on there behalf the 10s a year, and know also if they will please to abate her sd Arrear of £10.5s. This House & Garth was confirmed to Abra. Bunting for £1 a year from Mayday 1737. She is the last we have any Dispute with about holding over.

We acquainted you the 25 May last that the Court Barron was to be holden at keswick the 30th of that Mo. for admitting the Customary Ten.ts at wch place we attended & found the Tennants much averse to the paymt. of a generall fine having fee'd a Councell to attend on their behalf wch made the busyness very troublesome. This we were appriz'd of & in order that we might be prepared to make a defence we took Mr Simpson with us from Penrith to assist & appear for the Hosp. as Councel he being well acquainted with the Customs of the Manors of Castleridge D[erwentwate]r & Thornthwaite & indeed he managed so well that we hope every thing was done for the benefit & advantage of the Hospitall. Mr Simpson we doe assure you took a great deal of pains & attended 5 days for wch we gave him £3.3- wch is realy less than he deserved however if the board do not think him deserving of more we hope they will approve of what we have done in that respect.

The Tenants with much adoe produced their Grand Ind[entu]re after demand made by Mr King the Court keeper, not only at the Houses of those who kept it but in open Court, and after reading it in Court we insisted of a Coppy which they agreed to,

and it is now we Expect in Mr Simpsons hands Coppying. By this Ind.re all the Generall fines Certain & others by Alienation become due Six Months after the Death of Lord or Tennant, so that in strictness we had a right to receive all those fines the day of Assesment, but the Tennants having built upon a Wrong opinion that no fine was due, Came unprovided & pleaded hard for time which we Consented to, & agreed to accept of payment the 11 October next foor all those at Keswick & the 12th at Thornthwaite, which we hope the Board will approve off. The Arbitrary fines are due at the Will of the Lord; but it has been Customary to give six Months after the Assesment for the payment of them, which induced us to make all payable together the 11th & 12th of October next. The whole Arrears of Rent & fines will amount to near £1100, the particulars of which shall be sent you as soon as they Can be done.

As this Affair has been a very troublesome one, so it has been a Considerable Expence, tho' we hope the Directors will not think it so, if they will be pleased to Consider that the attendance was five days, & that we were obliged to take more than Ordinary notice of the better Sort of People, Jury &c the whole Expence amounts to $\pounds 9$ – 12 –d which we hope the Board will approve off.

Some time agoe Mr Francis Anderson of Alnwick Dyed indebted to the Hospitall £53.16.10 upon wch we wrote you that it would be proper for some person to take out administration in order to Secure the Debt, which being referr'd to Mr Radley, wee were advised not to administer, however being advised by Mr Greive Attorney at Law in Alnwick that we had no way of Securing the Hospitall, but by such Administracon we run the hazard of it in our own Names, & we have Since renounced the Administracon to the Duke of Somersetts Agents who has pay'd in the Debt with the Charges of Administracon . Mr Greive has had a great deal of trouble in transacting this Affair therefore we begg leave to recommend it to the Directors to give him two Guineas for his trouble.

Works, but Mr Barnes & Mr Stokoe are most to be depended upon. We shall Wait the Boards directions in this Affair & pursue whatever is their pleasure to order therein in the best manner we Can.

The Tennants of Scremerston Colliery have given us notice that they Cannot Continue at the present Rent longer, & that unless they have a very great abatement they can't subsist, & of Consequence must be obliged to give the Colliery up, till the Levell is drove, & then they say they will perform all their Covenant. The men have acted very honestly & pd their Rent so farr very well & we believe might be persuaded to goe on till the levell is finished at the old Rent, or it may be Sixty or Seventy pounds per Ano & as we hope they will be good Tennants for the remaining part of the Term at £220 we begg leave to recommend it to the Directors to make them such abatement as they think fitt till the levell is drove.

We reced. the Boards Minute of the 25 July Inst which shall be duly observed, but we are Concern'd to find such a misrepresentation as has been made in regard to the Woods on the D[erwentwate]r estate. We hope it will appear to be so far from a Misrepresentation, that there has not been any Tim[be]r Cutt for sale at all in all the Woods on the Estate, nor not one Tree for the Repaires, or other uses on the Estate, but what could not be avoided. There has been some Timber Cutt in the Man.r of Thornthwaite by the Ten.ts. who Claim a right to it by Custom, of wch the board has been acquainted, but Except that we do not know of any Tim
be>r of any kind having been Cutt & carryed off the Estates at all. The Bayliffs have orders strictly to survey the Sev.l Woods & we are taking all other proper methods to Inform ourselves of any thing relating this Affair, wch may have happend in the Estate, & have not Come to our knowledge, in order that we may give the Board a thoro' Satisfaction therein & we hope to doe it in a few posts & are Sr Yours &c

Ravensworth Castle Aug 20th 1739

We wrote you the Ninth Inst and Inclosed you Mr Johnson and Mr Buntings report on the Complaint relating to the Cutting and Carrying off Timber belonging to the Derwentwater Estate, Since which Mr Pearson the Bayliff at Keswick Informes us that in the Demesne Woods of Keswick no Timber of any kind hath been cutt down Except some decayed Oakes for building a Sheephouse for the Tenant of Goosewell which we orderd and approved off, as being very properly Applyed for the benefitt of the Estate when we were last at Keswick.

The Tenants within the Manour of Thornthwaite hold there Estates by Custom by wch they all claim a Right to the Timber which they or their predecessors have planted in the hedgerows, and we have been well Informed they have cutt down Timber in the hedgerows at their will and pleasure for their Necessary Rep<ai>rs time out of mind, Others Say it was done by permission of the L<or>ds Bayliff who had the Bark for his perquisite. But besides the Hedge Row Timber there is some Wood Land, which some of the Tennants Claim a right to, & as you were before informed, The Rev. Mr Jefferson did actually cut down & sell a Quantity of Birch & Alder by which he was we apprehend & is still liable to prosecution. That Severall of the other Tennants have also Cutt down Timber in the Hedge Rows, Since we have been Concerned is also Certain, but it is what we have apprehended they have a Right to, but in Case the Directors are pleased to order a Stop to be putt to it, whatever they direct shall be punctually observed. Parson Jefferson should really be prosecuted, for his not being so may have a very ill effect, in the Encouragement it may give others. But whether a Stop should be putt to the Tennants for cutting Hedgerow Trees may deserve to be very well

considered, as it will undoubtedly draw the Hospitall into an Expencive Law Suit about a thing of very little value. We have however repeated a Discharge to all the Tennants, which we often did before; but shall not take any other Steps till we receive the Boards further Commands.

Yours of the 8th Inst about the Woods and are glad you can say and affirm there is no Wood Cutt at Keswick except those dead trees you mention, & we saw that was for building the Hogghouse and we Earnestly desire that you will keep a Watchfull Single eye over those Woods and permitt no man upon any pretence to Cutt the Least Twigg there without a Direct order for so doing.

We are Sorry to find you give us such a Confused Accot. of what the Tennants at Thornthwait have cutt out of their Hedge Rows, as if we could judge of the number of Trees, or value thereof by what Bark they have sold, however you say it is all for their own use. We desire that you will at the Receipt of this go in person and take a Witness with you, and discharge all Thornthwait Tennants from Cutting any, either in Hedge Rows or Elsewhere, without the Lords Licence, and Pticularly warn that Tennant that you mention has Crop'd severall Trees in Thornthwait Woods, & sold the bark, that he will be Sued, and pray you why do not you send us his Name that we may order him to be prosecuted, we again desire the Christian Name & the Surname of every one who have Cutt or Carryed any Wood or Bark off, that we may send it to Mr Simpson, that they may be imediately Sued. we wonder how you can Sitt Still, & Suffer them to Crop Young Oake Wood upon that estate without giving us Pticular Notice, none of them pretend any Right to any Oake Wood upon the Estate, Except for repairing Houses &c, and that is disputable, and is to be by the Lds Licence, we hope you'll exert Your Self and are

We have made an agreement with Mr Thomas Stokoe for winning Scremmerston Colliery and the Directors have ordered an Article to be Drawn, to be sent for their perusal and approbation which I desire you will order to be Done so as we may send it away next Frydays Post, which O hope you may be able to doe from what follows.

Mr Thomas Stokoe of Bryans Lepe in the Parish of Tanfield and County of Durham Agrees Effectually to Winn the Colliery Called Scremmerston (near Berwick upon Tweed) in the said County and for that purpose to Drive a fair and substantial Level or Drift from the Sea Banks at high water mark, The level to be Three foot Nine Inches High by twenty two Inches broad and to be drove with great Exactness water Level without either rising or falling, in a direct Line till it Cutts the Seam of Coale to the full rise of the Colliery; and in all places where the Level or Drift may happen to be in Clay or Quick Sands, the same to be Effectually Walled with a Circular or Oval Arch, and in Soft Stone to be walled sufficiently with a perpendicular Wall on each side so as the same may be within the Walls 22 Inches Diamiter. He is likewise to sink all necessary shaftes or levell Shafts, to Timber the same strong and substantially and to leave them in the same Condition, and as soon as the Colliery is Wonn he is to Turn an Arch of Stone at the Bottom of each Stapple to prevent any damage to the Level which may happen either from those stapples afterwards running together, or from any other accident. And he is likewise to Sink and Effectually Timber one Coale Pitt at the place where the Colliery is won so as the Colliery may be ready for Coale work when the Winning is Compleated. The whole to be Done after the best manner and from time to time subject to the Direction and Approbation of the Receivers; and to Employ in the said work Constantly as many persons as the Nature of the thing will Admitt of, so as the same may be done with the utmost expedition. Mr John <Barnard> of Whickham to be Bound in £500 Bond for his performance. In consideration whereof the Commissioners or Governors of Greenwich Hospitall Agree to pay to the said Mr Stokoe the Sum of £495 which is to be advanced him as follows vizt. as soon as he has Drove and Carry'd on 50 yds of the Levell he is to be paid £40 and so on £40 more at the End of every 50 yds till the whole is Finnished or till the £495 be all pay'd.

and first The said Thomas Stokoe Doth for himself his Executors Admin[istra]tors and Assigns and every of them Covenant Promise and Agree to and with the said Nicholas Walton and Hugh Boag theor Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns and to and with every of them by these presents in manner and form following (that is to say) That for the Considerations hereinafter mentioned and Expressed He the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns shall and will within the space of Two Weeks next after the day of the Date of these presents sett on to win a Certain Colliery Called Scremerston Colliery in the said County of Durham near unto the Town of Berwick upon Tweed part of the said Forfeited estate of the said late Earl and thence forward at his and their own Costs and Charges prosecute the said work without Delay untill the said Colliery shall be Effectually Won and made a Current going Colliery And for that End and purpose shall and will in the prosecution of the said Undertaking Drive a Fair and Substantial Levell or Drift from the sea Banks at the high water mark, the said Levell to be three foot Nine Inches in Height and twenty two Inches broad and to be Drove and Carryed on with the Greatest Exactness a True water Levell without either Rising or Falling and in a Direct Line till the same Cutts the Seam of Coale to the face Rise of the said Coaleseam. And in all places where the said Levell or Drift shall happen to be in Clays or Quicksands shall and will Effectually Wall the same with a Circular or Ovall Arch, And when the same shall happen to be in soft stone shall and will sufficiently Wall the same with a Perpendicular Wall on each side so as the said Drift there may be within the Walls Twenty two Inches Diameter as aforesaid.

And Further That he the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns shall and will at his & their like Costs and Charges in the prosecution of the said Undertaking Sink all necessary Staples or Levell Pitts or Shafts and well and sufficiently Timber the same Strong and Substantially and leave the said Staples or levell Pitts or Shafts in the same Condition for the use and benefitt of the said Colliery And as soon as the said Colliery shall be well and Effectually Won Thay then he the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns at his and their own Expence shall and will twin a Substantial Arch of Stone at the Bottom of each Staple so to be put down in the said levell to prevent any Damage to the said levell which may happen thereunto either from the same Staples afterwards running together or from any other accident whatsoever.

And Further That he the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns also shall and will at his and their Expence and Charge Sink to the Coale and Effectually Timber one Coale Pitt at the place where the same Colliery shall be won so as the said Colliery may be ready for Coale work when the said Winning is Compleated and shall and will doe and perform all the said Matters and things after the best and most

Effectuall manner and that by under & subject to the Direction and Approbation of the said Nicholas Walton and Hugh Boag or such viewers and agents as they or their Successors or the said Comm<ission>ers Governours of the said Royal Hospital or any or more of them shall for that purpose Appoint And in the carrying on of the said Work and for the more Expeditious finnishing the same he the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns shall and will Constantly Imploy in the said work as many persons as the nature of the same works will Admitt of to the End that the same may be perfectly Finnished and Done as soon as may be.

And the said Nicholas Walton and Hugh Boag for and on behalf of the said Governors and Commissioners of the said Royall Hospital Do hereby for themselves and their Ex.tors Adm. Covenant Promise and Agree to and with the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns That for and in Consideration of the said severall Matters and Things so by him the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns to be done and performed They the said Nicholas Walton and Hugh Boag their Ex.tors Adm. or Assigns shall and will well and truly pay or cause to be paid unto the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. or Assigns the Sum of £495 lawfull British money in manner and form following (that is to say) the sum of £40 part thereof upon his and their having drove and Carryed on in manner and according to the Conditions aforesaid 50 yards of the said Levell or Drift and the like Sum of £40 more at the finishing of every other 50 Yards of the said Drift in manner as aforesaid untill the whole Drift be finished According to the Covenants or agreements herebefore mentioned or untill the said Sum of £495 be fully paid and satisfyed – it being the Intent and true meaning of all the partys hereunto That the said Thomas Stokoe his Ex.tors Adm. and Assigns shall have for the performing all the matters and things by him agreed to be done and for the providing all Workmanship Materials Matters and things for that purpose the sum of £495 and no more anything in these presents to be Construed to the Contrary notwithstanding.

We recd. Yours with the Boards Minutes of the 29th Aug last and a Copy of the Minute relating Mr Jefferson Cutting down Timber in the [Manor] of Thornthwaite dated the 22 March 1737/8.

It is a very great Surprize to find this Order of the Board of the 22 March 1737/8 unexecuted and we are in great Concern to find we have neglected any of their Commands and more Particularly so, as we can give no other reason for it than the Hurry we were in nst that time, when the Bill was in Parliament - which put it out of our heads then, and prevented us from thinking of it (as we ought to have done) after the Hurry was over. We think our Selves greatly Blamable in it, but hope as it was done without the least designe that the board will pardon us. The Case is now stated and lyes before Councellor Grey for his Opinion which shall be sent you as soon as it comes from him to our hands.

The Tenants mentioned in ours of the 20 of August last, who Claim a right to the Timber in the Hedges, as also Mr Jefferson, who Cutt down and sold the Birch and Alder, are all within the manor of Thornthwait, and hold their Lands during the Joynt Lives of Lord and Tenant by Admittance at the Lords Court, paying Certain Yearly Rents, and Arbitrary Fines according to the Custom of the Manour and are not within the Indenture; The form of which Indenture Admittance is as follows.

Manor of Thornthwait

A State of the case between the Commissioners of Greenwich Hospital and the Tenants of Thornthwait

The Tenants of the Manor of Thornthwait in Com[itatus] Cumb[erland] formerly belonging to the Earl of Derwentwater and now under the Direction of the Govern[or]s of Greenwich Hospital Hold their Customary or Tenant right Estates there by the payment of reasonable Arbitrary Fines upon the Death of the Lord Called General Fines and upon the Death or Alienation of the Tenants called Dropping Fines. Their Admittances are to hold during the Joint Lives of Lord and Tenant at the Will of the Lord According to the Custom of the Manor and are in all respects what are called in that County Customary Tenants at the Will of the Lord.

By the Common Custom of Tenant right used within the said County the Lords are intituled to all Timber Trees and other Trees (Except Brushwood or underwood) growing upon the Lands of their Tenants Allowing the Tenants reasonable Houseboot, Plowboot and Hedgeboot and as the Freehold of these estates is in the Lord the Tenants do not Pretend to Sell their wood or have any other tight in it than to take reasonable Estovers without the assignment of the Lords Bayliff. [In LH margin:] Estovers

As the Lords of the Manor have time out of mind had a great deal of wood growing upon their own Demesnes and there has been but little upon the Lands of the Tenants, it cannot be proved that the Lords usually Cutt down and Disposed of any of the Tenants wood But where a tenant has been Building upon his Customary Estate and has not had wood Sufficient of his own the Lords Bayliff has Assigned him wood in the Lands of another Tenant.

It cannot be proved that the Tenants of this manor ever offered to Sell Underwood [*] or wood of any kind either growing in their Hedgerows or Elsewhere in their Customary Estates till about [small blank space] Years agoe [**] some of them Ingratiating themselves with the Bayliff did sell some of the wood out of their Hedgerowes and the Bayliff connived at it but had always the Bark or some other gratuity for his Connivance. And about two or three years since when severall of the Tenants Pretending that they were Absolutly intituled to the wood growing in their Hedgerows began to Cutt down and dispose of the same & then the Bayliffe of the Manor thereupon Informed ag[ain]st them and they were all Convicted before a Justice of the Peace and paid their Fines.

Mr Jefferson a Customary Tenant of this Manor about [left blank] Years agoe sold a Great Number of Birch Trees and Eller Trees growing upon his Customary Estate but not in the Hedgerowes to one Miles for above Eight Pounds and some oak trees to other Persons for about three pounds, Jefferson pretending that the Birch Trees and Eller Trees are underwood and that he has therefore a Right to Cutt them down and sell them and has given Miles a Security to Indemnifye him for Carrying them off and Miles has now begun to Lead them away, the Oak trees were Carryed off some time agoe.

Q[uery]

Whether as the Freehold of these Customary Estates i in the Lord, and the Tenants have nothing but a Particular Interest in them, All the Timber trees and other Trees of what kind soever growing upon the Customary Lands do not belong to the Lord of Common right, tho it cannot be proved that the Lords have need to Cutt wood there for their own use. And whether tho the Ten[an]ts have usually Cutt Brushwood and underwood in their Hedgerows without the Lords Licence for their Estovers they are thereby Intituled to Cutt and Sell such Brushwood or underwood And whether large Birch Trees and Eller Trees are Strictly underwood. [In LH margin:] Estovers

All Timber and other Trees growing on those Customary Estates do prima facie belong to the Lord, the Tenants being only intituled to their proper Bootes, And the Lord has a right to cutt the Timber Trees for his own use, tho there be no Instance of his doing it, for the Tenants cannot cut them, and if the Lord had not that Poswer they must [rot] on

the Land. As to underwood or Brushw[oo]d [we're] of opinion the Tenants cannot sell it without a full proof of a Custom for that Purpose, for if they could sell it they might destroy the whole and thereby alter the N ature of the Evidence By Converrting Woodland into Arrable or Meadow which is Adjudged to be Waste; Birch and Eller are not commonly reputed Timber Trees unless in such places where oak, Ash and Elm are not to be gott.

2d Q[uery]

In case the Tenants should be able tol give 2 or 3 Instances of their Cutting and Selling wood and it should appear either that they Applyed for the Bayliffs leave to Sell and gave him a Gratuity for his Consent or that the wood was sold and Carryed off privately will this Establish their Right to Cutt and Sell wood at their Pleasure. And can the usage and Customs observed in other Neighbouring Customary Manors as to the Lords right of cutting his Tenants wood be given in Evidence in this Case or any ways Influence it.

I Do not think it a reasonable Custom (in case it can be proved) for the Tenants to cutt and sell Timber Trees And their Claim to Cutt and Sell other Trees ought to be fully provd to Maintain their right, or in Case it can be proved, that Application for leave was made to the Steward, or that the wood was Carryed off privately, it will destroy their pretence. The Custom in other Neighbouring Manors is not Material in this Case

If upon the whole Circumstances of this Case Jefferson has rightfully Cutt down and Sold these Birch Trees oak Trees and Eller Trees and if not what Remedy have the Gov[ewrnor]s of Greenwich Hospitall and Against whom for Cutting Selling and Carrying away these trees.

The King being Lord of the Manor, All the Trees belong to his Majesty, and since the Tenants Claim to Cutt and Sell by Pretence of Custome, I thgink the most adviseable Method is by Information in the Exchequer which will settle the rights, and is better than bringing an action at Law.

Last Post we Sent you our Cash accot. for the Month of Sept last and thereby acquainted you had received the greatest part of the Rents & fines at Keswick & Thornthwaite & that we wou'd Send this post a Sum in bills to the Treasurer this day wch. is Accordingly done to Mr Wood his deputy in bills amounting to Eleven hundred pounds.

The Tennants woud have gladly laid hold of any agreement to have Clear'd themselves of the General Fine & made a Good Deal of Objection, but after the Ice was broke by some of the principle Ones. Every One to a man pay'd that was able & the rest are willing when they become so. we have not yet had time to make out an accot. of those that have not pay'd but we Intend it as soon as we Can when it Shall be sent you for the boards Direction. In the mean time we must begg leave to recomend one poor weddow to the Hospitals favour whose fine is £20. of which she has been only able to pay five her name is Francis Lancaster of Thornthwaite, who has a Small family & cannot propose to pay more than at the rate of £5 per ann. in which if the directors are pleased to Indulge it woud be a great Act of Charity.

At the Court of Thornthwaite the Steward took Notice in the Charge of the Trespass which had been Comitted by the Revd.Mr Jefferson in Cutting down some Alder wood, & acquainted him & the rest of the Tennants, how much the Hospital took it Amiss that any of them Shoud presume to Cutt wood without the Lords Licence which we hope will have some Effect upon 'em As the Parson (who has been the ringleader) was afterwards very Submissave & we believe in a few posts he will Acknowledge his fault to you & desire to be admitted to make Satisfaction.

Thos. Jeffersonof Cokermouth in Com:Cumb:Clerk now is and for Sev.ll years last past has been Seised & possessed of a Tennant right on a Customary Tennancy called Lowgill holden of the King as parcel of his mannour of Thornthwaite in Cumb: by the payment of the yearly Customary Rent of £1:1:9 & other Dutys and Services.

Tho' all Tennant right estates are descendable from ancestor to Heir according to the Custom of the mannour yet the Lord still Continues seised of the freehold & Consequently intitled to the wood & the Customary Tennants According to the genn<era>l Custome of Tennantright can only have reasonable Houseboot Ploughboot Hedge boot & fire boot.

In the years 1735 & 1736 Mr Jefferson at Several different times between Michaelmas & Christmas cut off the Customary Tenement 240 birch trees which he sold to Wm Myles now deceased for £6:6 and gave Miles his Bond to keep him indemnify'd for carrying away the wood on paying him the purchase money. A Coppy of Mr Timothy Wranghams Letter to Messrs Walton & Boag the Originall sent the Board 11th December 1739

Gentlemen

I some time agoe Sent you our York Bill, and my own in the Cause between Wood & Moore, a Coppy of which You afterwards returned to me, nmost Sadly mangled & Clipt by some new Spirituall Prothonotary.

The Gentlemen at York are determined to Justifye their Bills and insist that I shall either Sue or be Sued for the whole Money.

As for my part I think I have as much reason as they can have to Insist upon my whole Bill, for I will readily make oath if required that Considering the Number of Letters I'vehad from York Especially for which I charged almost nothing, and the other expence I've been at in this Cause in Case my whole demand shou'd be paid toMorrow. I don't beleive that I should pockett so much neat Money as the deduction amounts to.

I treated in an amicable manner to have these bills paid till Ifound that treatys are useless things, and at last I was obliged to goe to an Open Rupture with Mr Wood.

I have now brought an Action against him in the Spirituall Court for the Recovery of these Fees, where I must endeavour to prove by Witnesses from York & at Durham that of the £8:5:6 (pretended to be deducted) the odd 5s/6d is not an overcharge.

I suppose Wood hath been advising with some person in our busyness who hath given him such Satisfaction as to the unreasonableness of these Deductions, that he'll make no Defence. I told him (as in Justice I ought to do) that if any Mischief shou'd befall him on Accot of this prosecution I wou'd (upon occasion) produce the best Evidence I Could for him of your having Engaged to defend and & indempnifye him in

this affair.

One reason of my Writing new to you is, because probably you may Endeavour to Accomodate this matter, without further Expence. And another is that you Shall not hereafter say that any Design was Carryed on against Wood (without your knowledge) which may possibly Effect you in the End.

I reced., wherein you acquaint me of a Letter from the Secretary of Greenwich Hospitle, whereby you were Directed to give me an Accot. that after the Submission I had made to the Comm[ission]ers of Greenwich Hosp. they have thought fitt to drop the prosecution upon the Accot. of my paying for the wood & all Charges; To these Particulars I desire you woulod Acquaint Mr Secretary that I submitt myself intirely to the Honourable Comm[ission]ers Pleasure abt. the Cutting down the Birch & Alder &c & tho' I don't think fitt to Contest any thing of this kind with them, yet as this might have been a Disputed Right proceeding from the Constant Usage & Custom of the Ten[an]ts, I hope my early submission, will Induce them to a Milder Treatment. As to the Charges of a prosecution, I cannot apprehend how there should be a prosecution & I not know of it, however if there be any such thing, there surely can't be much upon this accot. & its extreamly hard there should be any, since I submitted to them as early as I could; however, I pray Endeavour to Stop any proceedings of this kind, & I will pay them or their order, for what is done.

We also reced. your former writt abt. a fortnight agoe, both which Intimated to us what is required abt. Numbring the Trees in the D[erwentwat]er woods that was valued in 1737 in order for Sale, & Assoon as we reced. the first, we sent for the Persons formerly Concern'd & ordered them to go & Inspect the several woods, & consider what the Exp<ence> would be, & in what time they would Number Each Tree; & they Return'd with their Answer but yesterday, which was that it would take 3 months time to doe the worke with the same hands & that it will not cost less than about £80. Now if so, we apprehend that there will not be time for advertizing for sale, before the season of falling this year, besides there is now in this Country a very Deep snow, with a hard Frost, that its Impossible for any man to Travell into the Woods; or if he should gett to the Wood to stand to number Trees, & it is likely to Continue some time; Indeed we think Dilston wood which is the oldest & nearest the markett, as also Thornbrough Wood might be gott Numbred this year in time to advertize for sale, if the Weather should prove favourable & is we think as much nay more than this place will consume or take of in one Year for there is Considerable falls of wood in this Neighbourhood at present.

We reced the 54 Leases & Counterp.ts safe, & there is some of them Executed & the Remain.g pt will be executed in abt 10 days time, The Carryer took £2.2.6 for the Carriage of them, nay would not deliver them without the Money, was their any bargain made with him at the Delivery. Jefferson of Cockermouth, & acquainted him that unless he would make Satisfaction for the wood he had cutt down, in the Manour of Thornthwaite, & pay the charges of the prosecution begun against him the s.d prosecution would be carryed on; & we reced. the Enclosed of the 27 December last for answer from him at our Return the 6 Inst from a West Country journey, where we had been Rec<eivin>g pt of the D[erwentwater] Rents & settling with several Ten.ts at the Close of last Year.

We believe Mr Jefferson's submission, will putt an End to the other Tenants pretended Notion of their having a Right to Cutt wood upon the arbitrary estate. The value of the Birch & Alder Trees he sold of his Customary Arbitrary Estate to Wm. Miles of Keswick in the Year 1735 was £6:12:6. What the value of the oak or other wood cutt down since we have not yet been able to Certain but believe it was of no very great value but as he has submitted to pay the value as soon as it can be a Certained, we hope the Board will be favourable as to the Charges of prosecution.

There are several other Ten.ts within the manour that have Cutt down some wood within the same time, & we intend to call upon them also to pay the Hospital the value thereof, if the Board approve of it.

I have inclosed you a Bill of the Charge accrude in the cause Mr Bunting and really considering the Cause of action & the Circumstances of the proceedings the Expence could not be avoided As to Mr Bunting's ill usage & the necessity of commencing the prosecution you are Sensable of, you will perhaps think the Expences of this cause is high but if you will look into the bill & what I shall here mention touching the Coarse of this Contest perhaps you'll think it moderate in Trin[ity] <voc> 1738 process was Sued out in this Cause to which Def[endan]t by his Attorney Mr Ainsley appeared And in Mich. Term following a Declaration was filed & in Hil[ary term] After Def.t neglected to plead an Interlocutory Judgemt. was regularly obtained & a writ of Enquirey was issued and was Executed, but notwithstanding the assault was Sufficiently proved the Jury brought in no damages wch verdict the Sherif readily took.

The Sheriff finding the Court was to be moved agst. him for a misdemeanour herein offered to refer it to Counsell which being agreed to the agents on both sides attended Mr Counsellor Dennison, who gave his opinion for the pla[intiff>] to take Notice of this writ of Enquirey, but to stay till the return thereof & then to take out a new writ Pursuant to those Gentlemens Oppinion a New writ was taken out & Exempted & the Jury found damages. In Trin. term last Mr Ainsley upon Affid<avi>ts moved the Court to have the whole proceedings quashed upon paymt. of Costs & to be let into plead. The Court upon a full hearing agree'd that the Judgm.t> Shou'd stand but that the 2nd writ of Enquiry shoud be quashed the Judges giving for a Reason that as there had been one writ of Enquirey already Executed in the Said cause the P[laintif] shoud have had the <leave> of the Court for the taking out of the second writ.

There you see Mr Dennisons oppinion was naught & led us aside. Last Mich.s Term I mov'd for a New writ & to quash our first writ which was readily granted & Executed & has put an end to this troublesome affair. The prot<hess> granted was only £11:6:8 which I have Recd. for the Def.t. I am Gents

We reced. Yours with the Boards Minutes of the 23d April last which we duly observe, and beg leave to return you the following Answer.

In regard to the Number and Value of each Tree, in Dilston & Thornbrough Woods, we must observe that a new valuation must putt upon all those Trees, as they now stand Numbered, which will Cost about £16, & we apprehend doing the rest in the same manner, thro' the Estate may cost abt. £64 more, valuing only, besides the Marking, wch in the whole we formerly acquainted you, we Computed would cost abt. £80, so that to mark and put Pticular Valuations to the whole, we reckon will Cost about £160. Where large Woods lye together, it is very proper to divide into Lotts of the

different kinds of Timber, & to Sell those Lotts Separate, but we do not think it necessary at Dilston or Thornbrough as the Quantitys there will Sell together, better than in any other shape. There is no Expence attending Selling Timber in the manner Customary in this Country, it is generally advertized to be Sold a Considerable time before the Sale, Pticularizing the Number of each sort of Timber & the distance from the nearest & most conven.t places for consumption, & the persons who buys it, agrees to be at all expences of Cutting down & converting to Uses; & to pay a Certain Sum for a number of each sort of Trees, at such certain Payments as are agreed upon; And a limitted number of Years is granted for Cutting and Disposing thereof; which always is computed according to a greater or Lesser Quantity sold & according to the Quantity which the Marketts will take of Annually. In the present case we cannot omit offering our sentim<en>ts & hope the Board will not take amiss, that we are of Opinion, a Second Valuation will be of no real use. You have already a valuation of the whole distinguishing the severall Lotts and the Bark Separate, by which the Value is as well known as it will be, if it is done Twenty Shapes, which we apprehend is all that can be usefull or necessary, but this we only offer as our opinion & humbly submitt it to the Boards Consideration.

We observe that the Board approve the measures we have taken for Securing the Arrear due from Joseph Green of Raw Green, as also that his Sons should continue Tennants, provided that no Loss arises to the Hospital. In Answer to which we beg leave to Observe, that we have taken the best method we could think of, to Secure the Arrear & to prevent any Loss arising to the Hospital, and by appearance they are Secure, yet notwithstanding that, some unforeseen Losses may happen, & should it prove so, we think it would be hard, we should be subjected to it, as we apprehend, we are by the Boards Minutes; We therefore humbly desire that Minute may be laid before the Board to be Altered by Strik<ing> out the Words, Scor'd under, if they approve of it, or that they will be pleased to Signifye their displeasure with their directions for our Conduct in that Affair.

We find that Mr Stephenson has reported ½ of Windy brow to be possessed & wrought by G.L Esq. & Ptners, which it has not, but since his undertaking it has been always wrought by the Govern.r & Company in Dead Work under a Lease from the Proprietor of a Moiety. Now as that Proprietor and the Hospital are tennants in Common , the Govern' & Comp. will be liable to Accot. for Profitts when any arises to G.L.Esq. & Ptners & they to the Hospitall, for the Dues thereof, so that G.L Esq. & Ptnrs Claim the ½ as Tenn[ant]s in Common, & for that reason it was not reckon'd forfeited, or Advertized to be Lett. This we intended but omitted to remark to the Board, when we sent Mr Watson's proposal, as we did, that Cocklake was not in the Number Advertized, being a thing Supposed of little or no value, & never demised to G.L.Esq. & Ptners amongst the enumerated mines. As to the observations which have been made by the board on the valuation of the woods in the Derwentwater estate, we are at a Loss to know whether you Intend we Shou'd Clear it up to them, by Letter to Mr Corbett or that we shoud to you. but as it is no way taken notice of in the Minutes, we Incline to think it Improper to mention it to the Board till they require it.

We can Explain the affair no otherwise than by acquainting you as the board that the trees in many places where they are Valued so low, are such as either are decayed of Dwarfes which render them of so small Value, & it may be no hard matter to peck out some Thousands of that kind, many of which are of a much Less value than you mention. Mr Lowes's Letter Contains a great mant p.ticulars, which I shall pass Over and only Acquaint you with the Severall Facts upon which we grounded our Distress & what was done therein from time to time.

When we Comenced receivers a Rentall was Transmitted to us by the Board with their Order to Collect the Severall Rents therein Contained amongst whom was Phillip the Husband of Bridgett Horsman or the Father I know not which at the rate of 30s per annum & we had likewise a return of Arrears due in the late rec.ers time from Horsman & an Order to receive the money. In May 1739 after having made frequent Demands of Brigitt Horsman, Mr Boag was applyed to on her behalfd by Mr Busbie & she herself was with him & pretended the Derwent.r family had given her or her predecessers the house and Garth during Life but at the same time offerd to attorn Tennant provided the Hospitall wou'd accept of 10s instead of 30s a Yeare which he Cou'd not Comply with; & you are to observe that we never admitted her having any Right at all, therefore Mr Bunting was Ordered to make a Legal Distress which was done accordingly at which Mr. Downes was present, & Consequently I wou'd hope all was done with Strict regularity. The Directors were Acquainted with all these proceedings & approved thereof, so that in that P.tcular I hope we are warranted, & by which I hope you'll be able to give the young Lawyer a Satisfactory Answer, but I wou'd further observe that this House & Garth was Lett at the Generall Letting of the farmes on the Derw.water Estate by a generall Court to Mr Bunting which I think verry plainly Shews they admitted no person to have a right therein, or that it was the absolute property of Horsman as Mr Lowes would Insinuate. Moor as Lessee of the Vicarage and Tyths of Hartburn sued Wood in the Spiritual Court of Durham for Tyths arising from Grounds which he farmed under the Hospital at Greenwich.

Upon the return of the Citation Wood appeared and tender'd 2s 6d as a Modus for one years hay then due, which Moore Accepted in full of his demand for Hay, but at the same time declared he would proceed as to other Matters tythable.

Accordingly Moor gave in a Libel purporting himself to be Lessee of the Vicaridge and the large Quantity of Corn of Divers kinds and No. of Calves Wool Lamb &c which Wood had Converted to his own Use upon the Premises & of which no Tyth had been paid.

Wood by his Answer confessed the Lease and also charged himself with a great deal of Colrn a large No. of calves and other Small Tythes mentioned in the Libel being in the whole of Considerable Value, but by way of Discharge desired time (by the Proctor) to give in a defensive Allegation, wherein he designed to sett forth that his Lands were tyth free.

Being Indulged with a great deal of time and unable to procure proper Instructions for drawing his defense the Cause was concluded and Wood condemned in the Value of all such small Tyths (only) as he had withheld according to his own confession.

The Sentence was founded upon this principal ie that the Lessees of the Vicaridge was of common right intitled to those tyths till the Contrary should be made appear.

Hereupon the Cause was appealed to York & a Coppy of a grant from K[ing] James the 1st being at length obtained a Plea was there gikven in to the following purpose with the said Coppy Anexed.

1st. That in the 6th Year of K.Jas. the Rectory and all the Tythes of the Parish of Hartburn being then in the Crown & which had been formerly part of the possessions of the Monastery of St Albans whereby Letters Patent of his sd. Majesty granted to George Johnson Merch.t & James Gramesdic k Gent. their Heirs & Ass[ignees]:

2nd The sd. Rectory and tyths by legal Conveyances descended & came to Jas. late earl of Derwentwater who was legaly siezed thereof till the year 1715 when the

same amongstr other Estates became forfeited to the Crown by the Earls Atainder and by an Act of Parliament made in the reign of his late Majesty were Vested in Trustees for the use of the Publick and by an Act made in the 5th Year of his present Majesty's Reign the said Rectory and Tyths were given to his majesty for the like publick use and the Rents and Profitts thereof are now applied for the Support of the Royal Hospital at Greenwich.

3rd That the Tythes in the Cause sued for mdid arise within the Rectory and Parish of Hartburn aforesaid granted by the said Patent and forfeited by the sd. James late Earl of Derwentwater to the Crown under whom the sd. Ralph Wood now Farmes.

Moor by his answer confesses that the before mentioned Pretended Rectory and Tyths were pretended to be granted to Johnson & Gramesdick by Letters Patent in the Reign of K. James the 1st but he did not believe the Crown had any right to grant the same. He Confesses that these Tythes arose within the Parish of Hartburn but he doth not believe Hartburn to be a Rectory and he doth not know or believe any other part of Woods allegation to be true.

Woods advocate at York gave his oppinion that if the Court there should offer to Construe a Grant from the Crown & give Sentence ag.st him claiming under Such Grant a Prohibition would lye after Sentence and he recommended to Wood to proceed by Prohibition.

Accordingly by the Doctors Advice the Cause was Carryd on to Sentence without any Proof whatsoever of Woods Pleas and the Sentence at Durham was affirmed.

The proceedings were afterwards laid before Mr Dennison in order to have a Suggestion drawn and after a great deal of Consideration (and when it was too late to prosecute the Appealk to the Delegates) he declared it to be his opinion that there was no manner of Foundation for a Prohibition and so the Cause ended.

NB. Though More seems to have had an Equal right to all the Tyths both great and small he was so moderate (for what reason I know not) as to take a Sentencse only for the Small Tyths & did not medle with the Corn.

It seems plain from the language of the Grant that this living was formerly a Rectrory Impropriate and in Lay Hands who provided a Vicar to supply the Cure, how the same happens now to be a Vicaridge and the B.p of Durham to have the Advowson is not so easily to be accounted for.

Had this been a Matter of Dispute in the late Earls life time I doubt not but he Cou'd have shewn a proper Right to these Tythes, but as he is dead and the Title deeds of his Estate are loist and the same Right which he had to his estate is transferred to the Comiss.rs of the Hosp by act of Parl.t and as this Estate hath been Enjoyed Tyth free time beyond memory counsel ought to be advised with to know whither the Court of Chancery on proper Application would decree this Estate to be injoyed by the Commiss.rs discharged from payment of Tyths and in the same beneficial manner to all intents and Purposes as the late Earl enjoyed the same.

If any Suit should be renewed in the Spititual Court an Advocate at the Com<m>ons should be consulted to know if the Pleas given in at York be a proper defense and (as matters are Circumstans'd) to know what sort of Evidence would do to Support it.

Let the Tennant upon the premises enquire amongst his Neighbours and Ancient Tyth gatherers if Hartburn Parish whither 2s 6d a Year used to be a Modus confined to Hartburn [pay] alone, or whither the same used to be paid generally in Lieu of all Tyths whatsoever arising upon the Estate.

We reced. yours with the Boards Minutes for the 8 April Inst . the Contents of which we duly observe, & we coud have Answerd that part relating Mr John Ridley & that of the fee farme Rents Sooner, but that we wanted for an Ans[we]r to a Letter we wrote to Mr Ridley, desiring he wou'd send us the Article whereby he is Intitled to the Allowance of Timber, which we did not receive till Yesterday.

The purport of his Ans[we]r is that his P[ar]tner one Mr Pattinson (who is lately dead) had the Article in his possession, That his Estate & all his papers are in his Trustees han ds from whom he Canot gett the Articles. That he has been with Mr Watson one of the Late rec[eive]rs desiring the Counterpart who gives him for Ans[we]r that he d[elivere]d it up to the Board along with the Bond, so that we Apprehend it must be in your Custody. Mr Pattinsons Affairs are under the Management of a Trustee who is a Gent of our Acquaintance, to whom we will make Application for the Article and as Soobn as we have his Answer you Shall on this head hear further from us, in the meantime if you wou'd be pleased to make a Search for it, we may possibly all have less trouble.

As to the Fee farme Rents &c which have not been paid, we begg leave to Observe in the first place that Howdon Meadows, Nab Bellingham, Willomonswick, Hunderish house & Lina Cross are only Fee farm Rents & that Crookburn moor is one of what is Called an Ancient Inclosur in Alston moor That the proprietors of those Lands for which the fee farm Rents are payable, aledge they never pay'd any, & Absolutely refuse payment unless we Shew them to be due by some Grant, Deed or Otherwise which we Cannot possibly do as having No Title Deeds, Grants or other foot steps to make it appear. And as to Crookburn moore, the proprietor Alledges, that at the time the Same was Inclosed, the Derwentwater family Inclosed a part likewise which was laid to the Demain farme called Lowbyre & that in Lieu of Such part as was Inclosed by the Derwentwater family the proprietors of Crookburn moore Inclosure was to be Exempt from the payment of the rent, but this we think does not appear at all likely as the part taken in by the Derwentwater family Seems to have been this Separate proportion of what was in the whole Inclosed and Consequently that they cou'd not be exempted from the payment of Rent. The Rent of this Inclosure we think may be recoverd unless the proprietors can Shew some Exemption in writing which we dar[e] say they cannot doe. But without the titule Deeds of the Estate we are afraid the Fee farme Rents are not recoverable.

The Rev[eren]d Mr Jefferson has at last paid for his Trespass in Thornthwaite Woods with the Charges upon it, which we hope will put a Stop to the like practice in future. The Liberty which the Tenants have of wood for their Repairs has been granted them by us pursuant to the Board's Command; but we find an ill use will be made of it unless they are restrained to repairs only for Under the liberty granted to Jeremiah Waine by our Bayliffs he has begun to build a New house with the Timber he pretended to want to repaire his old holusing. This we think is breaking in upon the Antient Custom so we desire to have the Boards Commands therein.

In the breaking of the late Frosts the Mill dam at Keswick has suffered greatly & must of Necessity be repaired which will require a Considerable quantity of Timber. The Expence in the which may be at least £80.

We are Suprised [sic] at what you Mention one of the Clarks of the Exch[eque]r told you that people Cutting down p[ar]t of the Comberland Wood, and we do assure you there is no such thing going forward to our knowledge. Nor has there been any Cutt down Since the Numbering of the Trees, even for the Necessary Repairs of Houses, hedges boot, & plow boot but offall stuff. It is a petition by trustees of the infant Lord Kinaird, son of Charles Radcliffe, for a grant of the Amble estate in Northumberland, formerly part of the estate of the Earl of Derwentwater. It was awarded to the Duke of Richmond and James Brudenell for 31 years by Letters Patent in 1742.]

To the right honourable the Lord Comissioners of his Majesty Treasury The Memorial of the most noble Charles Duke of Richmond & honourable James Brudenell Esqr. Sheweth

[in margin:] Lease & Release of 18 & 19 Jany 1716

That the honourable William Radcliffe Esqr. Uncle of the late James Earl of Derwentwater by Indentures of Leases & releases made between him of one part & Ralph Radcliffe of London Merchant of the other part in Consideration of £3500 conveyed to Ralph severall Lands & prem[ises] therein particularly mentioned of about the yearly value of £250 & also £200 a year which was payable to the Said William during his Life out of the estate of the said Earl To Hold the same to Ralph his heirs & Assigns during the life of the said William. Ralph did not pay the consideration money but instead thereof gave then to William his bond in the penalty of £7000 for the payment of £3500.

[in margin:] 25 June 1719

That the said William was then seized in fee of the said Premisses

That by a deed pole executed by the said William to Ralph first reciting the said bond & that William had since the 19th Janry 1716 Agreed with Ralph to accept of the Yearly sum of £450 to be paid by Ralph to the said William during his life in full payment satisfaction of the said bond & of All moneys thereby secured & that upon payment of the said £450 a year by half yearlkyt payments the said bond was to be void. And that William his Ececutor or Adm[inistrator] should not put the said bond in Suit untill default should be made of payment of the said yearly sum of £450.

That soon after the date of the said deed poll the said William left England and went to and did reside at Rome till the time of his desease.

That it appears by Several Letters wrote by Ralph to William at Rome that notwithstanding the aforesaid deeds Ralph accounted withg William for the rents & profits of the aforesaid Lands & premisses & also for the said £200 Annuity whereby it appears that the said deeds only collourable & that Ralph was William's Trustee & Agent.

That Ralph never paid the said bond or any part thereof.

That incase the said deeds were not colourable ralph had only therby an estate in the prem[iss]es during the life of William.

[in margin:] 26 Oct 1732 O[ld] S[tyle]

William dyed at Rome a Batchelour without issue having first made his will in writing bearing date the 24th day of July 1730 N[ew] S[tyle] and thereby devised & bequeathed all his reall & personall estate (saving a few Legasys) to James Radcliffe by the name of Lord Kinaird Eldest Son of the said Williams Nephew Charles Radcliffe & there is in the said Will the following clause Viz: I leave to Mr Ralph Radcliffe of London, Merchant the sum of £3500 Ster[ling] which he owes me by his bond. And my will is that my Executors do deliver up unto said Ralph Radcliffe his said Bond & that at the same time he shall give to my heir the possession of my land which he holdeth.

That the said Will was drawn by a notary Publick at Rome & executed in the presence of him & two other witnesses but they have not Subscribed their names as Witness thereto which was according to the Law of Rome.

That Ralph has been Applyed to on the behalf of the said Lord Kinaird (who is an infant) to be lett into possession of the premisses & to be paid all the rents & profitts thereof which have accrued due & been received by Ralph since the Death of William.

That Ralph has refused to comply theirwith under pretence that the will was not Legally executed by William there not being three subscribing witnesses thereto for want of which Ralph insisted that said infant is not intitled to the premisses or to the rents & profitts thereof.

That the said Ralph hath ever since the death of William Possessed the said premisses & rec{eiv}ed the rents & profitts thereof.

That in Case the prem[iss]es do not pass by the said will its apprehended that the Crown is intitled thereto For James late Earl of Derwentwater deseased was the said Wms Eldest Nephew & would have been his heir at Law had he survived William

That the said Earl was attained of High Treason all his Estate forfeited to the Crown & he dyed in the year 1716

That the said Earl left a Son & a Daughter the son dyed a minor & the Daughter is now the Lady of the right hon[our]able the Lord Peter who its apprehended cannot take the said prem[is]es as heir at Law of the said William by reason of the attainder of the said Earl her Father .

That in regard it was the intention of the Testator William that the prem[iss]es should go to the infant And that their not being three subscribing Wittnesses to his will was owing to the Testator's ignorance of the Laws of England relating to wills

Wherefore your memoriallists hope your Lordships will be Pleased to use your intercession with his most Gracious Majesty for his Grant to your Memorialists of the Prem[iss]es & of the rents & profitts thereof since the death of the said William.

Robson & Severall others, who have Invaded the Right of the Hospital, Farmed by Mr Reed in which we must defend him — The Case will appear to You at large, by an Information, which is drawn to be Swore to by our Bailiff, as alsoe what Methods we are advised to pursue by Mr Grays Opinion, which Mr Bunting will Shew You. As therefore Mr Gray advises to have the Ryotters Apprehended and bound over to the Assizes, I must begg the favour you would take Cognizance of the Matter & grant your Warrant Joyntly with Sir Wm. Middleton or Mr Delavall, that the Fellows may be brought to Justice. We have laid the Affair before the Commiss[ione]rs of the Hospitall & Expect in a few posts to have their orders as to any further Steps which may be necessary to take to Support Mr Reed in the Affair.

With regard to the Resentment you Shew upon Receiving our last, we have nothing further to say, than Such kind of behaviour verry ill becomes you & in Case a proper Representation of it is made to the Hospital, you will probably have reason to be Sorry for it. We for our part have nothing in View with respect to the management of the Estates under Our Care, than to have the whole Adsministered with Justice to our Principalls & to Everyone who has the least Concern in them. But when most Evident facts appear of of Injustice how do we act up to the Principles we profess if we dont take all the Methods in our power to detect & punish the Offenders. That you have Willfully Comitted an Act of this kind we do not pretend to say, but that you have thro[ugh] Indolence permitted it we are afraid is too Evident; however it be , this we are certain of, that it will be to your Int[eres]t to Act up to the Repeated diurection given you & if you do, you can in no respect so much oblige

As I said before I have just time & can hardly Save the post, so if you will be pleased to See if therein I be right Calculated & if it should be of any Service to you to Judge whether of these are the most Advantagious biddings I shall be glad of it. As to the difference in the damage of Ground it is a Small matteer, but you must take Care that the purchaser is to pay the Tennants damages for way leave & passage thro' any other Lands, but what the wood realy grows upon, I mean in any other Inclosure. I am of Oppinion that when Mr Smith is Approved of the difference which his manner of proposing make that he will make his payments as early as Mr Hall & do not doubt but both will go further. I begg you will use a deal of Caution & do not be too hasty. We are in no do0ubt but the Derw[entwat]er Woods in Northumberland will come up to what we have always valued them to or near it.
